
"You'll never walk alone - well not in Heacham!"

Refusal of Church Lane Development

Readers may recall an article regarding 'Possible New Future Developments in Heacham South', submitted by T Parrish and advising residents not to be complacent as there are developers out there who wish to ruin the look of OUR VILLAGE.

Recently, the residents of Church Lane and St. Mary's Close were faced with re-development of part of Church Lane including the conservation area. The recommendation by the Borough Council was to approve the construction of 16 homes following demolition of 2 bungalows. However, the Planning Committee required a site visit prior to making their planning decision.

Various objectors posted placard notices of discontent and vehicles were strategically parked to show what could happen with an overflow of parking if the development proceeded. The internal sizes of the proposed garages would not accommodate a modern size car and dwelling room sizes questionable.

Whilst the development was refused and received Press coverage, this would not have been achieved without additional help. Therefore, the residents would like to publicly thank Councillor Stephanie Smeaton and Parish Clerk Philippa Sewell for their efforts and objectively speaking on behalf of the residents at the Planning Meeting.

I was surprised to see the church so full and lots of children in uniform. It turned out they were the Scouts and Brownies from the village celebrating Founder's Day, which I learnt was a day the Scouts recognize as Baden Powell's birthday. The Beavers read a letter that Baden Powell wrote before his death to the Scout Association. The children were very good, not too much fidgeting.

I see the ducks are pairing up again — everywhere except near the ponds. People are still feeding them on their doorsteps, which means there is duck mess all over the paths. This seems to be worse down Folgate Road. The ducks are lovely and an important part of the village, but they need to be living on the ponds, not on people's driveways or killed on the road.

Do other people have the same problem when they go and fill up with petrol? It does not matter how careful you are, you can never just get £10.00 of petrol – it is always £10.01! The petrol companies are making enough money from us on a commodity, which we all need – they don't need our extra pennies.

If 300 people visit the petrol station in a day and $1/3^{rd}$ have to pay the extra 1p, that is $100 \times 1p$ so an extra £1.00 a day which is £7.00 a week and £364.00 a year extra they are making through this sneaky penny. Just think what the RNLI, Royal British Legion or the Air Ambulance could spend this money on!

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Facelift for WRinKL and West Norfolk Mind

With the help of their local charity partners, Veolia Environmental Services and Seetec Workplace Employment

Programmes, West Norfolk Mind's 'Bits and Pieces for Mind' furniture store has received a facelift to its furniture recycling business based in King's Lynn, selling not only good quality budget priced furniture but now also bric-a-brac and a wide range of second hand books to browse through.

Also on the same site at Saunders Yard, (off Austin Street) in partnership with Seetec, West Norfolk Mind are developing a wood recycling project called Wood Recycling in King's Lynn (WRinKL), which includes its surrounding area. The aim of the project is to give unemployed local people and West Norfolk Mind service users the opportunity to learn new skills, be creative, and produce saleable items to sell at their West Norfolk Mind charity shops and community events to raise much needed funds to support their services.

In addition to off-cut timber sales, the range of items on sale include hand made wooden garden furniture, planters and bird boxes at very competitive prices, available to order in a variety of colours and can include delivery if required (charges apply). The project however needs to attract ongoing donations of new and used wood of any size (must be untreated and unpainted) to survive. These can include surplus/damaged timber, off-cuts, used timber i.e. scaffold boards or boarding discarded after renovation work.

Bits and Pieces is self funding and reliant on our loyal team of volunteers who run our busy showrooms and van alongside employed staff.

Why not pop in, have a browse, take home a bargain or pick up some information about the other services West Norfolk Mind can provide.

West Norfolk **Big Switch & Save**

West Norfolk residents could save money on their energy bills thanks to a new scheme launched by the Borough Council.

West Norfolk Big Switch and Save has been created to help residents across West Norfolk find cheaper energy tariffs for gas and electricity. By grouping thousands of households together it is possible to negotiate much lower energy tariffs than if an individual was changing supplier on their own. Schemes elsewhere in the country have seen residents save an average of £160 per year on their bills!

The scheme launched on 1st March and closes for online applications on 8th April. Energy suppliers compete in an auction to make the best tariff offers to those customers who registered an interest. This deal is then offered to those households and they can then opt to change to the new tariffs if they want. There's no obligation and further auctions will take place later in the year.

If the householder opts to change to the new tariffs, the switch of supplier will be carried out automatically.

The more households who join, the stronger the bargaining power to drive down individual energy bills. You can help by spreading the word among your friends and family, but it is also possible to register up to five households on the same email address, which means neighbours and family members could help each other sign up too.

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
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Heacham Brownies

Incinerator update

During the public inquiry it has been interesting to note that the health consultant working for Cory Wheelabrator (CW), also appeared as a witness on behalf of the tobacco industry when the US Gov was considering laws to ban smoking at work. At the time he argued there was not enough evidence to show smoking was harmful. During cross-examination at the incinerator inquiry, he acknowledged it would release fine particulates, dioxins and heavy metals. CW still refuses to give the specification of their intended pollution filters, arguing it is not a planning matter. It is important, because some legally permitted pollution filters are not very effective compared to others. If CW intended to use the best performing filters, you might expect they would shout about it. During crossexamination, CW's air quality consultant confirmed dioxins, cadmium and mercury emissions would only be measured for a maximum of 16hrs per year.

The public inquiry continues sitting 4 days a week, Tue-Fri 09:30 start at the Professional Development Centre, Kilhams Way, King's Lynn, next to the Fire Station (access via Estuary Road). At an evening session on Tuesday 9th April, the public will have another chance to speak 18:00-22:00hrs (there will be no daytime sitting on that day).

The first of KLWIN's witnesses is expected to give evidence from 11th April.

Following the 2011 referendum, just two of West Norfolk's County Councillors stood up to say our votes matter. After making a principled stand to defend voters' rights, both Cllr Brian Long and Cllr John Dobson were then attacked by their own party colleagues for putting constituents first. In May their colleagues will be knocking on doors asking for West Norfolk's vote in the County Council elections. Voters can decide whether they want councillors who put voters' interests first or those of the party leader.

Together with the Majestic Cinema, KLWIN intends to show the important Jeremy Irons documentary 'Trashed'. It shows what is happening with the world's waste - 20th April.

Heacham at Night

On a clear night, an event too rare this winter, Heacham offers some good views of the night sky. Not as good as further around the coast and inland but certainly better than the very badly light polluted West Midlands. This month, April, offers chances to see just three of the eight planets of the solar system, Jupiter, Saturn and Venus.

Jupiter has been the very bright star like object that you may have noticed over the last few months high up towards the south and west. During April it gets lower in the sky and will fade into the twilight. On 1st April it will be visible from about 8.30pm and rather less than half way up the sky. If you have binoculars, try and see if you can see its four brightest moons: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. These are easily visible in a small telescope and you might also see the bands of colour on Jupiter's surface.

Saturn is the planet with the rings and the end of April is when it is visible at the reasonable time of about midnight. It is also as close to Earth as it will be (though still well over 1000million kilometres away). Consequently, it is at its brightest. Look south and about a quarter of the way up the sky from the horizon. To see the rings, a wonderful sight, you really need a small telescope. A pair of binoculars might show you the largest moon of Saturn, Titan. It will appear as a speck of light close to the planet. A small telescope will let you see six moons.

Last year, Venus was a brilliant object in the evening sky and appeared close to Jupiter. They could easily be seen even amongst the lights of the High Street. This month, Venus returns to the evening sky but is not in such a good position. However, from 30th April it is visible for a short time just after sunset. This is where Heacham beaches prove useful. Stand on the beach or sea defences, watch the sun go down and then look to the right of where it vanished for a bright star like object. Binoculars will help but ONLY use them when the sun has set. Venus will be more easily seen in May. I saw Mercury really well from South Beach in February.

The Panstarrs comet is still visible through binoculars but you need a clear sky, a good pair of binoculars and be prepared to accept a fuzzy image. It is towards the north-west. If you have access to a computer then make a search for Panstarrs and you will find a web site with a diagram showing you where to look.

On 25th April from about 8.30pm there is a very slight eclipse of the moon by the Earth's shadow. Nothing like a full eclipse when the moon can appear red or a true partial when half the moon vanishes for a few minutes but a bit of a darkening. Astronomers have to be grateful for what they get!

There are many other things to look out for with eyes, binoculars and telescopes. Turn the lights off, dodge street lights, find a dark spot somewhere, and have a go. An excellent, free, piece of software called Stellarium can be downloaded from the Internet and will help you find your way around the sky. Amateur astronomy groups can help with equipment and showing you where to look. The closest to Heacham is King's Lynn and District Astronomy Society though the North Norfolk Society is not much further away.

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Heacham's Future

For a number of years there has been concern regarding insufficient parking in the High Street.

Following an **EU** directive sp00f2013apr villages must now provide sufficient parking, with entertainment, for residents and visitors within a 50km radius. Because half of Heacham's residents are fish this radius means an extension beyond Norwich and Peterborough.

You may already be asking where such a facility might be built. Well the empty dairy building is an ideal site for the erection of a multi-storey car park for 500 vehicles. To maximise the use there will be a night club on the upper floor operating from dusk to dawn. In addition the roof will be an observation terrace and restaurant to enjoy the setting sun over the Wash. This proposal will bring life to the evenings and early mornings.

With the concern over the HS2 railway route through central England, there may well be the possibility of the route being diverted through King's Lynn to Hunstanton then a tunnel to Holland. This will assist with improved travel routes for visitors and migrants.

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Hunstanton & District Rotary Club

Recently we have been able to help several local groups who have been operating with the help of volunteers and have badly needed financial support.

One of the most important is the 'Blood

Bikes' Charity. Perhaps readers are unaware of the immense value that is given by their unpaid volunteers. The charity is independent of the NHS and relies wholly on donations. The charity uses motor bikes or cars to provide an out-of-hours courier service taking medical essentials to hospitals and other health institutions within the local area. They carry blood, biological samples, medical notes, x-rays and scans, free of charge.

Then we have given important support to assist volunteers who run support for the youth of Hunstanton who are aged 13-18 yrs. The Hunstanton Youth Café is based at the Bus station café in Westgate. It is staffed entirely by volunteers who depend on donations to provide TV, playstation and computer facilities.

Vouchers have been given for the King's Lynn Police Station Family Room to provide food and essentials for babies and older children who are at the police station through no fault of their own.

Recently, Rotary Past President, Bob Wright, has introduced the Centenary Award to the Sixth formers at Smithdon School. Started in 2005 to celebrate 100 years of Rotary, one award is given annually by the Club. Students are assessed on what they have done in and out of school, perhaps as a project, for example in games or as club members and whether they have provided help to others. This might be, for instance, for their work in mentoring younger students and generally showing 'Service above Self' (Rotary's motto). In addition to a Certificate, the winner is given £250 towards his or her further education.

Rene Rooth is a recent member of our Rotary Club. At a Club meeting we were enthralled when listening to an account of her life's experiences. She was born in Brundall, near Norwich, spending holidays in Dereham as a child and gaining a love of the seaside with holidays in Old Hunstanton at her grandmother's beach hut.

Moving from Yarmouth to North Burlingham, she lived in a house with poor facilities (for instance pumps were needed to obtain water). As a young teenager she went off to a finishing school in Switzerland, becoming proficient in French, then later on to Calcutta. Here, it was an unsafe environment but Rene managed to do some teaching there. After two years in France and attending a secretarial course she worked in the Liberian Embassy on visas for passports. Back to this country where she married her boyfriend in Swindon, and became an Army wife. They moved to Hong Kong, surviving a typhoon, then on to Singapore, Germany and back to Britain, at Fleet near Aldershot. Her next stay abroad was in Zaire. When visiting the equator she and her children were attacked by hornets, a most painful experience. While in this country she kept chickens for a time. Her husband moved to GKN (Guest, Keen and Nettlefolds, a global engineering group), also working when needed, as a British Embassy official. When her youngest child was 8 or 9 yrs old the children were lost for two days but the plane on which they were on had been diverted from Brussels to Paris, travelling unbeknown to their parents. Nobody seemed to know where the children were but they arrived safe and well, late, but at their school.



In Zaire, a scary incident was when one daughter became very ill with suspected meningitis and only payment of a bribe enabled the car to get through for a doctor to see the child.

In 1970, Rene's husband's work was in Poland with GKN. This was an unsafe environment then with the house constantly bugged. Next, came a three year stint in North Carolina and the purchase of a weekend retreat by the sea. Electric storms were frightening apparently!

Back from abroad with GKN, she then moved to Farnborough in Hampshire and in 1989 with retirement, moved to Massingham in Norfolk. Here she helped backward readers at school. Lastly, she moved to Heacham to be near the sea. To say her life has been exciting is an understatement.

15 March 2013

If you have not already done so, register for PAYE online filing so that you are ready to file your Employer Annual Return (P35 and P14s) and starter and leaver forms P45 and P46 online.

19 March 2013

Postal payments for PAYE month ended 5 March should reach your Accounts Office by this date. If you pay late, interest will be charged and you may receive a late payment penalty.

Due date for filing of monthly online CIS return to 5 March 2013.

22 March 2013

Electronic payments for PAYE month ended 5 March should reach HMRC's bank account by this date. If you pay late, interest will be charged and you may receive a late payment penalty.

31 March 2013

Private companies with 30 June 2012 year ends should file their accounts at Companies House.

Corporation Tax returns for accounting periods ended 31 March 2012 should be submitted to HMRC.

PAYE tax code changes on Forms P9 will arrive. Expect your payslip booklet – if you use one – for 2013/2014.

Ensure you are registered for PAYE online filing.

Employers: do not forget to keep all PAYE records for 2012/2013. Keep copies of pay records, forms P38(s) and forms P11 (manual, electronic or calculator versions within the employer PAYE Tools) until 5 April 2016.

5 April 2013

LAST DAY OF THE 2012/2013 TAX YEAR and the deadline for various tax claims and elections some of which are listed below:

- Personal Tax deadline for electing to transfer (part of) the married couple's allowance from husband to wife, or withdraw such an election, for 2013/2014.

6 April 2013

Remove any Month 1/Week 1 codes carried forward from 2012/2013 tax year so that they are on a cumulative basis for the new tax year.

Savings – the ISA limit increases to £11520, of which £5760 can be in cash.

The Junior ISA subscriptions limit is £3720.

You will be sent your 2012/2013 self assessment Tax Return (SA100) Form or Notice to Complete a Tax Return (SA316) by HM Revenue and Customs.

7 April 2013

Deadline for VAT Return online submission and related online VAT payment for quarter ended 28 February 2013.

19 April 2013

Postal payments for month/quarter ended 5 April should reach your Accounts Office by this date. If you pay late, you may have to pay a late payment penalty. This includes tax and NICs due under the IR35 rules.

Every Minute Counts campaign

Heacham is the latest community to receive one of 100 defibrillators installed as part of the Every Minute Counts campaign.

Heacham now has 24/7access to a potentially life-saving defibrillator installed by @EoECoop #EveryMinuteCounts.

Heacham is the latest community to have one of the 100 defibrillators, funded by the East of England Co-operative Society, which was installed on Wednesday 13th March.

As part of the Society's Every Minute Counts campaign, 100 defibrillators are being rolled out to rural and harder to reach locations across Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex.

The unit has been installed on the outside of the Co-op store at 48 Station Road, Heacham, to provide 24/7 access to the potentially life-saving equipment in the event of a cardiac arrest.



At the event, John Pendle, the East of England Co-operative Society President, introduced the campaign that will provide vital emergency equipment and heart-health education to one hundred local communities. He was joined by Andrew Barlow from the East of England Ambulance Service, which helped to choose which areas would most benefit.

Chairman of the Parish Council, Councillor Martin Johnson

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joined local residents and community groups to learn more about how the defibrillator works. They were able to practise using the equipment on resuscitation dolls, under the expert guidance of first responders and members of the Ambulance Service.

Amanda Long, Executive Officer – Membership, Marketing and Media for the East of England Co-operative Society said: "It was great to see local residents take such an interest. While the defibrillator gives step by step instructions, which would be backed up with support from a 999 operator, we also want to highlight how action in the first four minutes can help to save a life. The enthusiastic and knowledgeable medical representatives were able to answer questions and provide insightful demonstrations to give local residents more confidence in the event of an emergency."

Andrew Barlow, Community Partnership Manager for the East of England Ambulance Service, said "In the instance of a Cardiac Arrest, an ambulance will always be dispatched to the scene. When a call is made to the emergency services, if there is more than one person with the casualty, the caller will be directed to the nearest defibrillator. An access code and guidance will be given over the phone by the 999 operator and guidance on how to use the equipment."

"Once we have arrived on scene we will then take over care of the patient. If someone can administer CPR or use one of these community access defibrillators within the first four minutes while an ambulance is on route, there is a significantly higher survival rate."

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THE SONG REMAINS THE SAME

Monthly musings on music by Frank Edmonds

Britain's finest white soul singer ... Definitely

She had a voice that could stop traffic – almost literally. Legendary Atlantic Records producer Jerry Wexler has described how he was driving to work in Manhattan one day when he heard a Dusty Springfield song for the first time, on the radio

He practically had to stop the car because he simply could not believe this amazing voice he was hearing. High praise indeed from someone who has worked with so many great names, from Ray Charles and Aretha Franklin to Bob Dylan and Led Zeppelin.

And yet the cruel irony is that when Dusty finally got to work with Wexler herself, with the same people with whom her heroine Aretha had cut some of her classic songs, she was so crippled with insecurity, with the bizarre sense that she was somehow "not worthy" to be there, that – frustratingly for everyone else – she couldn't bring herself to sing a note for a fortnight.

Yet this is the paradox of Dusty Springfield, the girl born Mary Isobel Catherine Bernadette O'Brien, who came to become almost two different people. Dusty the diva, possessed of an astonishing voice, and yet at the same time relieved that she was literally so short-sighted that she could not see the audience; and Mary O'Brien, the simple Catholic girl, who she liked to think of herself as the "real me."

Dusty tended to get the reputation of being stroppy and aloof with people, most likely a mixture of her insecurity, and the fact that her eyesight was so bad that you literally needed to stand in front of her before she could see you.

Yet the diva reputation seems curiously out of place if you see clips of her Sixties television show, in which she would chat nervously to the audience between songs in a shy and self-effacing way, like you might to a casual acquaintance. Perhaps, outside of the barrier of a song, that was Mary O'Brien coming out.

In fact, there's also a curious story about Dusty's memory. Dusty – always a bit of a stunner, let's be honest – had that very Swinging Sixties way of dancing on stage, raising her arms alternately, and bringing her wrists level with her face.

This, it is claimed, is because her memory was so bad, she sometimes had to write the song lyrics along the inside of her arms, so she could remember how to sing them!

It seems a bit far-fetched – but we have the word of one of her three regular backing singers, Madeline Bell, so who knows. Yes, the same Madeline Bell who went on to achieve a good deal of success in her own right with Blue Mink in the Seventies. And Madeline says that while Dusty could certainly be a handful, Mary was a lovely person.

Incidentally, another of Dusty's regular backing singers was Lesley Duncan, who people with particularly good memories may recall as also carving out a more modest solo career for herself in the Seventies, in the Judee Sill/Claire Hamill female singer-songwriter mode.

Dusty would be described as Britain's finest white soul singer, or even the "The White Negress," partly also from her championing of Black America's Motown music in its early days. And yet her career started in a totally different fashion in the Fifties, with yet another alter ego – that of Shan Lana, one of the Lana Sisters.

No, me neither. Dusty – sorry, then just Mary – answered an ad in The Stage magazine for a third member for "established sister act" The Lana Sisters (who, perhaps unsurprisingly, weren't really sisters at all).

They released a number of singles without troubling the UK charts (although their cover of You've Got What It Takes was a top ten hit in Ireland in 1960). But they toured with the likes

of Cliff Richard, Adam Faith, and even Morecambe And Wise, and scored a couple of TV appearances.

Mary – sorry, Shan – then quit to become Dusty. She joined her brother Tom, and Tim Field (later replaced by Mike Hurst), who had been The Kensington Squares, to become the trio The Springfields.

Now take a deep breath, because yes, Tom actually was her brother, but no, his name wasn't really Tom! It was actually Dionysius P. A. O'Brien (so let's face it, it was a bit of a relief that he became known as Tom). Confusing I know, but just hold on to the fact that hardly anybody used their real names in showbusiness in those days.

Why "The Springfields"? The name that would become legendary as a surname with Dusty in front of it had the simplest of beginnings — chosen merely because the group were rehearsing in a Somerset field, in springtime.

The Springfields rode the folk boom of the early Sixties, all acoustic guitars and earnest, strident vocals. Listening to them now, with the miracle of hindsight – or just with a better appreciation of what a fantastic voice Dusty had – it seems odd to hear her almost battling to make herself heard above the general folkie mêlée.

Balanced against that was the fact they were voted Top British Vocal Group two years running in the New Musical Express polls (1961 and 1962) – and to be fair, their No 5 hit Island Of Dreams was a great song.

Perhaps best of all, when the trio travelled to Nashville, Tennessee in a bid to make their album Folk Songs From The Hills as authentic as possible, Dusty's head was turned by the more pop-orientated rhythm and blues sounds – and a new direction beckoned.

This was put to good use straight away with her very first solo single, I Only Want To Be With You, in 1963, which set something of a template for classic Sixties pop – a superbly-produced mix of lush strings and snappy arrangements, and simply excellent songs. It was a million seller.

The formula would be refined, as Dusty added a yearning vulnerability to songs like You Don't Have To Say You Love Me and I Just Don't Know What To Do With Myself, or a smoky sultriness to the heart-stopping The Look Of Love, or her cover of Spooky.

It would be so easy to go completely over the top in singing such dramatic and emotional songs, and yet Dusty's tender fragility, and the sheer wonderful sound of that voice, was simply masterful.

Dusty's image was also striking – peroxide beehive, and the famous "panda eyes" look, awash with kohl, so copied over the years. But the hits spoke for themselves, and Dusty topped UK polls for the World's Best Female Singer for three years running, from 1965 to 1967.

Along the way there were classic albums, like A Girl Called Dusty, and Dusty... Definitely. But as the volatile Sixties moved from Carnaby Street pop to psychedelic protest, Dusty's music suddenly seemed a little out of step. The album she made with Wexler, Dusty In Memphis (which produced Son Of A Preacher Man and the equally wonderful Just A Little Lovin'), was critically lauded, but not a commercial success. It is now considered one of the finest albums of the Sixties – but that didn't help at the time.

Dusty would retreat to relative seclusion in America, and it took a rescue mission from long-time fans the Pet Shop Boys to return her to the top of the charts on both sides of the Atlantic in 1987, with What Have I Done To Deserve This?

Sadly she developed breast cancer, and died in 1999, aged 59, just before she was due to be bestowed with the OBE. But she left a legacy that proves, as one authority put it, that she had "a voice that can chill the spine and warm the heart."

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The Kitchen Gardener

My mum used to take the roast out of the oven, cut a thin sliver from the outside and pass it to me on the tip of the knife. As I write, I can still taste that hot, salty, crisp and deeply savoury meat. She called it 'chef's perks'!

A French friend used to do the same with the two moist oyster shaped morsels nestling in the leg end of the carcass of a roast chicken. He would hand one each to his girls who were conveniently hanging around when the roast was carved.

Another perk is a hot and almost, but not quite, burnt sultana or raisin pulled from the outside of a just baked scone or rock cake.

I have 'gardener's perks' – flavours, crops, sights, scents and thoughts that come from cultivating my own little patch. These last few weeks, my perks have been the Brussels tops. I pick them as the sprout crop ends. There are always some lost to the weather and pesky pests, but still enough to anticipate, cook and enjoy. A brief but delicious episode in the long life of the Brussels sprout plant.

I discard the rough outer leaves, give them a wash, slice and cook them like spring greens. They need watching like a hawk as they cook in a jiffy. Once in the colander, a press with a saucer gets rid of excess moisture. Sweet, tender, nutty and delicious, there aren't many things they can't be eaten with.

Mixed with an equal amount of mashed potato – maybe with some chopped cooked carrot and plenty of seasoning – they make a lovely bubble and squeak. Put a fried or poached egg on top and we have a plate of good peasant food to fuel our excursions and exertions. I won't get into the brown, red or Worcestershire sauce argument!

The coldness of spring so far has held me back a bit, although digging and manuring any spare ground has been done when the weather has allowed. I hope that digging is getting air into the soil to encourage bacterial activity and deep penetration of plant roots when they are eventually planted out.

I can see that after the soil has been turned the birds are on there 'pdq', hopefully scoffing weed seeds and pests and giving the soil surface a general spring clean.

When I gardened on heavy clay I would dig in the autumn so that the clods would be broken down by the elements. If I did the same with the light chalky soil I have now, come spring it would be like concrete.

In the absence of suitable weather to get on with other things, I got around to a job I have been promising myself I would do for the last year or two and removed all the seep hose fittings. I gave them a couple of days soak in soapy water then a good scrub with a toothbrush to remove the gubbins. Could have grown a small crop with the soil residue in the bucket!

I am hoping the weather warms up in time to get the potatoes planted towards the end of March. I can't control it (thankfully) so if no warmth arrives it is a matter of waiting. How does that prayer go? Something about accepting the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference.

At the end of March I will start successional sowing of outdoor lettuce. A pinch of seeds into a small pot eventually pricked out into trays to bring on in the greenhouse before hardening off and planting out. I repeat this every two or three weeks through to the end of summer. This method gives a continual supply of salading rather than a whole row which invariably bolts before it can be eaten.

The beginning of April is the busy sowing time; first of the beetroot into drills outside, then in an unheated greenhouse the Brussels, purple sprouting broccoli, basil and dill together with celery, marrows, cucumbers and squashes.

While I am gearing up for the busiest part of spring, a perk seems like a cunning plan! Rock cakes are the order of the day.... good,

simple, honest baking. A real treat and quickly made. Served warm from the oven with a cup of builders' tea or a good coffee – what more could you want?

Rock cakes are best eaten the day they are made; however, they freeze very well. Alternatively, I keep mine in an airtight tin and give each rock cake approx 10-15 second ping cuisine just before serving, which is an excellent way of preserving the freshness problem. Because I like to use plenty of spices, the microwave method is great for bringing out their flavours.

Place 8oz (225g) self-raising flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1 teaspoon mixed spice into a bowl and rub in 4oz (100g) margarine until the mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs. Stir in 4oz (100g) white or brown sugar and 4oz (100g) dried fruit and mix to a stiff dough with a beaten egg. If the dough is too dry add a teaspoon of milk. I have a horrible habit of adding too much milk, so instead of rock cakes they spread in the oven and flatten somewhat. So keep the mix on the stiff side.

Put heaps of the mixture on to greased baking sheets and sprinkle with a little sugar. This quantity will make around 14 cakes. Bake for 15-20 minutes in a pre-heated oven set at gas mark 5, 190C, 375F, until golden brown and firm. Cool for a minute or two before placing on a wire rack.

This is an obliging recipe if you like to ring the changes. I often add some dill seed saved from last autumn's dried seed heads. 2oz candied peel can be added to the 4oz of dried fruit. The dried fruit can be replaced with a mixture of chopped ready to eat dried apricots and stem ginger, or blanched roasted slightly chopped almonds and glace cherries, or pistachios and sultanas.

Whatever, you can be sure that as they come out of my oven, some tasty, too hot morsel will be picked off for this gardener's chef's perks!



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Musings from The Potting Shed

Flowers seem intended for the solace of ordinary humanity.

About six days ago I sowed my first tomato seeds. These were all heritage varieties and three were given to me by our French farmer friends who live close to the farmhouse called Las

Rochas that I bought with my retirement lump sum way back in 1995. Yes, I was of the incredibly lucky generation who contributed one sixth of our salaries to a pension fund that was matched by our employers. In 1971, I was invited by my employer to make a further contribution towards (a) getting an index linked pension and (b) receiving a lump sum on retirement. I was not earning a huge salary at that time, in fact it was less than £900pa and we also had four children. However, we bit the bullet and paid the extra amount in. It paid off handsomely and when I retired, I got a good pension, a lump sum and the pension was index linked. The Iron lady started the rot when she persuaded people to take out private pensions and Gordon Brown completed the process when he decided to stop giving tax relief on the employers' contributions. The employers have now stopped paying their share and people now worry about how they will survive upon retiring. This is what our current government call Fiscal Responsibility and I call theft. Now they are trying to turn the clock back and it's all too late. Oh dear, another Drew rant! So back to tomatoes. I have sown, Black Krim, Cornue des Andes, Aunt German Ruby and three varieties I have grown before called Green Zebra, Garden Peach and Black Brandywine. I now wait anxiously to see what emerges. If I have success, I will let you know what they taste like.

The person who has started to write a garden column in my place, be they male or female, is doing a fantastic job. I suspect they are far more clued up than I and I hope they continue the good work. It's very good to get a different slant on gardening and I can relax into my usual slothful state and stop worrying. Yes, I did worry about what to say (I still do) which is why I nearly gave up. Now, having changed direction I can talk about whatever I like. Like the first paragraph of this contribution.

The Tree Surgeon, or Arborist as I believe they prefer to be called, has had a good go at my huge conifer. It took him 2 ½ days in total and he removed a lot of timber. The chap is returning in a couple of months to check on the shape but I'm pretty chuffed with the result. My neighbour Brian now gets much more light on his garden and I've put in some assorted cuttings to make a hedge between us both. I just pray that the cuttings will strike.



After a coldish weekend, I awoke to snow and bitter winds this morning, as did you all. I was hoping to rotavate some horse manure into my raised beds today, ready to sow broad beans as soon as the soil was warm enough. In fact I was also considering putting down some permeable plastic sheeting so the soil would warm up quicker. Instead, I'm sitting here, all grumpy and wondering what to do. Lazy tyke, there's loads to do but it's too cold. Thinking of plastic sheeting reminds me of a fiendish ploy I had some years ago. I sowed a bed of broad beans, and then covered them with said sheeting to encourage early germination. About a week later I lifted one corner to find a load of bean hulls. Mice had moved in and scoffed the lot. Well, I think I had about six plants germinate. Another lesson learned. Warm the ground before planting, don't try to be clever!

The front page of the EDP today, showed a car churning along a flooded road. The water was piled up in front of the car, above the radiator. I wonder how far the person driving got before their electrics failed or water was sucked into the air intake. Aren't we glad we live in the desert area of Norfolk?

I see inside the same paper that Nick Clegg is proudly boasting about how he and his party are preventing the Tories from "veering to the right". Well, I thought Coalition was about working together not pulling apart. I don't personally think much of any of them but I do think that if they all talked things over and forgot party differences, together they might sort out the mess caused by the banking system fiasco.

Tesco are placing a load of full page adverts saying how sorry they are about the contaminated meat they sold. Well, why don't they pay farmers a proper price for the food they sell and stop buying it cheap from Europe? As I've been preaching for years, if we grew our own food as much as possible, we'd be able to, occasionally, have a bit of meat to go with it. That's if you want to eat meat. If you do, then your local butcher can sell you a cheaper cut which I'll bet will cost you less than a Tesco ready meal. Pork belly, for instance is cheap and tastes lovely either roasted or turned into a casserole. And that's rant no.2.

The following is from an article I wrote in April 2001. I said I was going to repeat some of them and there has been a bit about peat recently. When I first came to Heacham – all the way from Ingoldisthorpe – many years ago, and found myself confronted with a large unkempt garden, I started sowing flower and vegetable seeds in trays to restock the garden as I cleared it. Like most other people, the seed and potting compost I used was based on peat.

Then one day I saw a photograph of an area of bogland in Ireland, which had been stripped of peat to supply the likes of me with cheap seed compost. It looked terrible, a barren featureless area covering many acres, which would be useless for years. There and then I resolved to try alternatives to peat based seed compost.

Some of you may well say, "What good is a peat bog anyway". After all the Norfolk Broads were originally formed from the digging of peat for fuel as is still practised in Scotland and Ireland. However, mechanical stripping doesn't just leave pretty lakes as a habitat for other creatures. It leaves huge featureless plains, which take many years to regenerate. Bogland provides living space for many plants and animals and who are we in our arrogance to destroy their homes just so we can have convenient seed compost?

So what can we use instead of this finite resource? Well first there is coir made from coconut husks. This is quite a good peat substitute but when you consider the distances, cost and pollution involved in getting it from Ceylon to Britain, it seems a bit daft to use it. What we should be doing is to use compost made from recycled materials and a number of companies now make quite reasonable seed and potting composts from non-peat, non-coir materials. These substances range from composted animal manure, through composted bark, bracken to garden waste.

A seed and potting compost needs four attributes. It must allow oxygen and carbon dioxide to diffuse to and from plant roots. It should retain water, making it readily available to the plant. It should contain sufficient and suitable plant nutrients and it should provide physical support to the plant. In addition it should, of course, be free from plant pathogens and weed seeds. Finding peat free products is not very easy. Coir based products are fairly easy to find but it isn't too easy to manage as it can appear dry on the surface whilst being wet lower down. Composted waste such as is available from our 'tip' is quite good as long as you sieve it and add some sharp sand to improve its drainage. You can make your own as I do which works well some times and poorly at others depending on how careful I am preparing it! So next time you want some seed or potting compost, think of the terrible damage being done to the countryside and shop around for other products.

I went to another Green Team meeting last week. We had the grand total of six attendees and that included the Parish Council Chairman. The collection of glass was discussed and we agreed to explore the possibility of having a collection point in the village centre. Noise is a problem so the collection point needs to be sited away from houses if possible or restrict use to daylight hours.

Plastic waste is also a problem, as at present only high density polyethylene is accepted. However, there is an organisation that collects and recycles polypropylene from which most bottle tops, margarine cartons and the like are made. Efforts will be made to see if these items can be collected in the village, in which case a collection point will need to be designated. The Green Team are investigating recycling of these sorts of materials and are hoping to get the help of 'The Matthew Project' (an organisation which helps young people with drug and alcohol problems) who are able to organise collection and recycling of different plastics.

Heacham in 1921

Thursday 6th March 1921

Further adventures of S. C. Neville-Rolfe's descendants.

Thinking that breakfast was at 8 not 8.30 as it really was, our student had made an appointment with Thacker for 7.45 to dig up the wasps' nest – but of course he was not called till 8 and thinking he had a quarter of an hour, began business leisurely. [Business here should be interpreted as washing dressing and shaving with a cut throat razor]. Margaret went round to his door and in a voice, asked how long he would be. He had to say 5 minutes as there was absolutely no prospect of doing it in a shorter time.

When ready he met Thacker and they went to the wasps. It seemed that there were either two nests, and one destroyed, or one large nest with half destroyed. They fiddled and then decided to do the other lot that evening. He hunted round and saw his cousin Cuni. They departed from the others as was their custom and walked over to the river with the object of seeing trout.

They walked down to the water's edge and she was particularly glad because she wanted to see the depth of the water covering the step because of the boats. She told him about her wonderful diver which would sink or swim at command. She never saw any trout because they were out of her horizon in no time, but he indicated the waves that they caused. However, it was getting late and they rejoined the others. When the two had gone away they sprinted to their breakfast.

After this essential meal, he dismantled all the pictures on one side of the French room because the wall was damp. Louis [Louis de Soissons, architect] had been busying about it when he was there the day before. They were Gerald Torrey's watercolours. They wrapped them up separately in large Times sheets and carried them up to the top of the new wing to the store room. That had to be rearranged as everything was anyhow, and he came in useful again there in shifting things etc. When Eugenie went up there, Margaret was quite surprised at the small amount of fuss she made.

He then strolled over the road to look up Ramsay – he lodged in a house next to the Cabin. (Somewhere near where Messrs. Gimlet and Bradawl used to live.) The student found him having breakfast in his room. Ramsay went out to meet him who told him to finish his breakfast etc. The student took a seat in a chair. Ramsay at once began to offer him a ride in his car, which he said he would love, but didn't think he would have time. Ramsay asked a few questions and seemed very fit just as ever he was. He said that at Christmas he had felled a tree, and cut it up for Church House – It was plenty large enough to last them this year as well.

He spent most of his time playing golf over at Brancaster. He plays his brother Tyle and anyone else he can get hold of. He said that Tyle plays a very good game still.

In order to keep himself warm he gets into a sleeping bag and sits in an armchair when it is draughty. Rather a good idea thought the student. That afternoon he was taking all the children out for a ride in the car. He had got £150 for his smashed up car and sold the remains for something like £50 – so he had a substantial amount with which to buy a new one. After a little more talky talky, the student assured him that they were bound to knock up against one another before long as people in Heacham always do, and returned to the Mill House.

After doing nothing in particular for half an hour, Margaret sent him over to Marie (Margaret's older sister 1844-1931) to tell her that they were going out for a motor ride. He went through the fields across the railway line, and via the Paddock.

He spotted Marie's house from the green House. The moment he saw Marie he was opened to publicity – she began to tell Perfit, Bransby and Clarke that he was there. "Hello' she yelled. A voluble continuous roar followed giving him not a second for a word. At length he bawled out "Aunt Margaret is coming to take you for a ride in the car": She continued to explain how bad her rheumatism was, and foisted Audrey's Album on to me, and sprinted upstairs like a centipede. In her rigmarole she said that when she got up that morning, she had never experienced such bad rheumatism, and told what a simply wonderful album Audrey's was. "He would so enjoy it."

He opened the blessed scrap book to appease her and save himself from the untrue. It was the rottenest show he had ever seen. The photos were bad (mostly postcards) and stuck in worse. Of course he knew not a single person or scene until he came to a photo of a cousin in his first term at Osborne. The house quivered – vibrated – a stentophonic scream pierced the door. "The car is ready". He laid the book aside, and met Marie who had just come down the stairs.

He saw Clara and told her that he had not yet used the key. We two strolled up the drive and saw Audrey. Luckily she recognised him. She had changed considerably. They had not met since 1912 or 1914. She had been in Heacham with the two boys and they had been to a circus or something. He believed it was Easter or possibly not.

In spite of Marie's remonstrance's, I walked with Marie up the whole drive at 0.25763 miles per hour. Margaret assured them that there was absolutely no hurry. Audrey had passed and gone into the house: they had reached the car.

The weather was boiling hot.

"Sedgeford" said Margaret to Thacker. Protests from Marie "It is all right my dear we are going to remain in the car, while our nephew pays his call."

He sat in front with Thacker and they purred off. The car still in A1 condition and ran beautifully. It was so nice to go along the Sedgeford road again – the mill – that lovely old Mill on the left, with the stream also. At Sedgeford they swung round into the gates, their war memorial is not half so good as Heacham's – but does for such a small village - it is an obelisk in the middle of the triangular batch of trees, before going to the gates – where the road divides from Stanhoe and Fring.

The roadway from the Lodge inside the Hall is still bad and dangerous. He couldn't imagine why they don't make a decent one. Over the little bridge, and up the hill they went into the beautiful park. Coming down the other side, they saw Muriel waving her hand. They drew up – an apology, saying she was waving to the other car, informed us that Uncle Holcombe's car and her children were following them. They drew up in front of the front gate and he sprang out. The car subsequently circled round under the shade of the ash tree – not the beech tree. – there are two trees overhanging the drive.

The 19 year old student went into the Hall in search of his great Aunt Jane (1850-1928).

Next month I will consider a game larder.

March Meetings in Brief

The Saltings: The Council thanked Mr Brown for organising a working party of hand scythers to cut reeds on the Saltings. A large area ready for the creation of a new scrape had been carefully cleared.

Mayor's Awards: The Council congratulated Mrs Sylvia Lee and Mrs Jean McLoughlin on their awards for voluntary service given by the Mayor at the annual ceremony.

Donations: The Council agreed to make small donations to support groups including Home Start, The Samaritans as well as the Norfolk Accident and Rescue Service, all working in the local area.

Sea Defences: Council expressed frustration when it was reported that Central Government would only fund about 15 % of the cost to maintain the sea defences in the future. The rest of the funding would have to be met with what appeared to be a complicated arrangement of new levies and local taxes.

Bus Stops: The Council had received several requests to change the positions of the bus stops in the Lynn Road/ Hunstanton Road area. The Lighting and Watching Committee have been tasked with reviewing the current arrangements and assessing new locations.

World War I: The Council discussed what appropriate events might take place to mark the 100th Anniversary of World War I in 2014. The Council agreed that red poppies could be planted around the village and possible sites were identified. It was noted that the Scouts and St Mary's Church were also planning to mark the occasion next year.

Horse Chestnut Tree: The Council noted with regret that the mature Horse Chestnut tree at the Parish Office had been further affected by "bleeding canker". The tree was covered by a preservation order; therefore permission would need to be sought prior to any removal.

Christian Bookshop: The Chairman was pleased to confirm that the Christian Bookshop had taken out a new lease for a further two years at the Council's Lodge Road property.
