

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM

Greetings from the Manse:

"Always, every day, give God permission to do what he wants with you" – Mother Teresa. When I see words accredited to Mother Teresa I, like many others, tend to take notice. These words were addressed to John Pridmore. I did a little research and discovered a modern day conversion story, how he moved from "I'll take what I can get" to "Now I want to give."

John was born on 7th February 1964. The crunch point in John's life came when he was a boy of ten. His parents told him that they were splitting up and he could choose which one to go with. The two people he loved most had failed him, and he was determined not to risk giving - or receiving - love again. Life with his father and his father's new wife was tough. His father showed more care for his new stepchildren than he did for John, so he tried to get attention in the only way he knew- by getting into trouble. At fifteen he was in a detention centre and once out he did not go home again. He gambled and stole to survive and took drugs to deaden the pain. Still he refused love. His philosophy was to take what you want from life - no one else will give you anything. At nineteen he was in prison; his role models were those who had money and everything that could bring, and organised crime seemed the route to get there. He began "bouncing" at several of London's most popular night-clubs, and earned plenty with the money that he gained from setting up drug deals. They could bring him in thousands in a few minutes. He had everything that money could buy - expensive flats, cars and women. Yet he had to take drugs to dull the pain he constantly felt. When he got home he could not bear the silence even for a few minutes. Why was he so unhappy, he asked himself? He had everything that anyone could ask for in life, but his life seemed empty. It was then that God spoke to him. John had experienced a difficult couple of months. He had wounded a man seriously enough to put him in hospital and he did not yet know whether he might even be up on a murder charge. He came back to his flat one night as usual but in the unbearable silence he heard a voice. It was the voice of conscience but more than that; it was the voice of God. And that voice told him all the wrong things that he had done. John felt terrified. Then for the first time he prayed - for God to give him another chance. "All I've ever done is to take from you, God. Now I want to give."

The first thing that John read in the Bible was the story of the Prodigal Son. He cried as he recognised in himself the wayward sinner. He knew that God had forgiven him, now he had to forgive himself. And that took longer. He heard the words of Jesus as he sat looking at a crucifix. He said: "Go free - I love you." John gave up his job as a bouncer and gave away much of his money. He worked among young people in East London, as a postulant in a Franciscan order in the Bronx, New York, but returned to the UK where he could work among young people with his own background and share the brokenness they experience and that he once knew. In schools he tells young people the truth about drugs, money and worldly success; best of all, he tells them about Jesus.

A resurrection story to encourage and remind us how the Saviour has the grace and power to bring life out of death. With every blessing as we approach Lent.

2014 marks the centenary not only of the start of World War One, but also the "birth" of the large pipe organ in our Parish Church



We would like to extend to you all our very best wishes for a happy and healthy New Year.

The Year of Faith, which was started by Pope Benedict to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the Second Vatican Council and the twentieth anniversary of the publication of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, ended in November, the end of the Church's year. The start of the new Church year is now leading to a period of new evangelisation. Bishop Alan said as part of his address after the procession and vigil "We must let Christ touch and transform our personal lives so that our actions are in tune with the faith we profess. We must let that same Christ touch our parishes and communities so that they are ever-more welcoming places in which those seeking hope and reconciliation can meet Christ. Finally, we must go out and share the Light of Christ with others. That is the mission of the whole Church, bishop, clergy, religious and lay people."

We will be arranging our social calendar shortly for the coming year. The first social occasion is usually the Pancake supper on the evening of Shrove Tuesday. Look for details on the website or the bulletins, which are displayed at both churches.

Incinerator update

The planning decision is still not known. Opponents of the incinerator have pointed to Wheelabrator's record arguing that Norfolk cannot afford to have a "High Priority Violator" (HPV) here. This is the term used by the United States

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to describe some Wheelabrator incinerators in America. According to the official EPA web site, five Wheelabrator facilities are currently listed as violating various environmental laws including the Clean Air Act. Fourteen had formal enforcement action taken against them within the last 5 years.

With the King's Lynn incinerator proposed for a location upwind of the town and existing air quality already poor in some areas, pollution is an important issue. During the planning inquiry, KLWIN asked Cory Wheelabrator for their intended filter specification but they declined to provide it. Even after a price reduction the Willows incinerator still represents the most expensive alternative to landfill at £105 per tonne. West Norfolk Borough Council's green alternative is much cheaper costing only £55 per tonne to recycle waste. Material Works have secured £100 million of private funding and Environment Agency certification for their process, which transforms waste into composite building materials; creating around 200 jobs. Economically and environmentally it is better than burning.

If the incinerator were to go ahead it would represent a gross injustice. West Norfolk would be recycling virtually all its waste, while at the same time being forced to burn waste from the rest of Norfolk. County Council officials have still not given a convincing reason why Norfolk should pay inflated prices for incineration over the next 25 years.

The Kitchen Gardener

February - late winter, in which I talk rhubarb and eat my words. But first - I've continued my research into the domestic life of our forebears, looking at how they made use of every last thing. In winter the grease

left from cooking the festive goose, (called grease rather than fat because it's the softest of the fowl fats with the lowest melting point) was highly valued for its versatility.

Creamed with vinegar, lemon juice, chopped onion and parsley, it was used as a sandwich filling. The grease was used as a skin protection before application of hot poultices; used in the dairy for dairy-maids hands and keeping churn parts greased; on cows udders and children's faces to protect against chapping; melted and mixed with horseradish, mustard and turps it became an ointment for rheumatism. The sheepdog had goose grease smeared into his ears and between his pads to aid and protect him in his work during snow and icy conditions.

Trying to adapt, not waste and to use what's to hand, I made myself a handy flour shaker by hammering holes into the lid of a jam jar with a thin nail. It works really well, giving a nice sprinkle of flour rather than a cloud of dust from a meshed commercial product.

February or March offer a last opportunity to divide rhubarb to increase stocks, to have an extra crown for forcing so that main crop levels can be maintained, or to revive an old and flagging producer.

Dig up the crown and either trim back (with a sharp spade) to 4 or 5 buds or divide the whole crown into pieces, each with 4 or 5 buds. If you have a choice, opt for buds that are pink and showing. Dig plenty of well rotted manure or compost into the planting site and plant about 3ft apart so the top of the crown sits slightly proud of the soil surface. Do not pick or try to force the first year after planting. Let the plant establish itself and your rewards will come in future years.

I mulch around the crowns with well rotted manure or compost late December early January and again after feeding later in the spring. I don't cover the crown as it can cause rotting, I've also noticed that, if crowns are covered, the seed head production increases about threefold the following season.

There are various methods for forcing crowns. One of the easiest is to cover a crown with around 4 inches of straw or leaves, sometime between January and March, then cover to exclude light. Leave enough headway for the sticks to grow and if the



cover you are using is lightweight - a plastic dustbin for example - weight it well or you will forever be rescuing it from various places in the garden, and trying to make good the damage it will do flying about in the wind.

Once a crown has been forced it is exhausted. It's best left to recover for the rest of the year. A different crown should be forced the following year so there is a rotation to allow a good main crop production to continue.

Cold late winter weather, starchy comfort food - what's not to like? I always think of the winter squashes as the parsnips of the cucurbit family. Sweet, dense and a vivid colour they add an extra dimension to the winter store and table. If grown to maturity and the skins well hardened they have an excellent storage life - last year I ate my final one around the end of March but it was in good condition and would have stored a couple of months more

During a recent discussion with friends about their eleven course tasting menu at a posh resto, I agreed that a winter squash and mild cheese combination, that they'd all left, was pretty dire and said I didn't think squash and cheese could work. Later, turning the compost heap, I gave my sweeping statement further thought and challenged myself to come up with a dish that would be seasonal, use cheese, and give the squash a bit of zing.

First cut your squash. Easy enough with the small Uchiki Kuri, but the large and handsome green blue skinned Crown Prince with his bright orange flesh requires a bit of guile. Take your largest sharpened sharp knife and make a cut from the centre to the outer edge and leave the knife there. Take your next largest knife and cut a wedge of any size. This is a technique I taught

myself in desperation when I got a knife stuck fast last year. The first knife can fall out when the second cut is made, so I do my cutting in the sink where a falling knife can do no harm.

I dry roasted the squash, skin side down, with a bunch of sage, rosemary and thyme laying on top to be removed once cooking is over. The aromatics penetrate the flesh very well. I laid the warm peeled and cubed squash on top of some peppery mizuna leaves and added some chopped shallots that had been macerated in raspberry vinegar, a suspicion of salt and a generous grind from the pepper mill. This had a gentle turn in the serving dish then I crumbled some Roquefort on top - I chose this blue for its bite, slightly grainy texture and saltiness. As a finishing touch - for crunch and that slightly bitter aftertaste - on went some lightly toasted broken walnuts.

Having thoroughly enjoyed eating my words, I thought this winter salad ensemble would make a good packed lunch, contained in Tupperware or in a big fat pitta bread.

I've tried roasting the squash seeds, husk and all as the gods and goddesses of gardening suggest; frankly it's like chewing on a cardboard box. So I dry then rub off the gubbins from the seeds and at various times de-hull them. Usually when on the phone or at odd moments - like waiting for supper to cook.

My tasks for February - weather permitting - will be to plant my shallot sets, sow pak choi and lettuce for an early crop in the polytunnel, sow spring/summer cabbages, sow hardy outdoor lettuce to follow on from the poly crop, sow peppers and - my special tradition - broad beans on St. Valentine's Day.

THE SONG REMAINS THE SAME Monthly musings on music by Frank Edmonds

The Eskimos' very own Dreamboat

One of the perils of being a music obsessive is that there I was on Christmas Day, watching the Strictly Come Dancing Christmas Special, and do you think I was thinking: "Wow, isn't it lovely to see Flavia Cacace again, and isn't she as wonderful as ever?"

Well all right then, yes I was, actually – but in the next breath I was scratching my head and thinking: "That song they're dancing to, Never Do A Tango With An Eskimo – that's a bit different from the usual festive tune, isn't it? And who in the world sang that?"



The answer, to my great surprise, as readers with longer memories than me would no doubt be able to tell me, was Alma Cogan. Alma Cogan ... now there's a name from the past, albeit one I only really associated with her No 1 hit, Dreamboat. This, to my mind, put her in the same bracket as, shall we say, the more matronly singers of the Fifties, such as Anne Sheridan and Vera Lynn.

No-no-no-no-no-no-no-no!, as Alma herself sings in the chorus of Eskimo. Alma, for those of you like me who didn't know, was a lively, vivacious, fun-loving and – let's not beat about the bush, here - drop-dead gorgeous young lady, who became known as The Girl With The Giggle In Her Voice.

Chart-wise, she was the most successful female singer of the mid-Fifties, the highest-paid British female entertainer of her era, and ultimately enjoyed a run of 18 hit singles.

She was a friend of The Beatles, at one point had her own TV show, and was briefly engaged to the writer and composer Lionel Bart. And then she fell ill, and was diagnosed with cancer, which claimed her life in 1966. She was just 34.

Alma was born Alma Angela Cohen, in Whitechapel, East London – although her stage name was closer to her father's family name, Kogin. His family emigrated from Russia, while her mother's family were refugees from Romania. Alma's sister was the actress Sandra Caron, known latterly for The Crystal Maze.

Her Jewish father Mark was a habadasher, and the family moved a lot for his work. Her father was also a singer, but it was Alma's mother Fay who had aspirations for her daughters, even naming Alma after silent movie star Alma Taylor.

Aged just 11, Alma won a prize in a Sussex Queen Of Song contest, and at 14 Vera Lynn herself was sufficiently impressed on hearing Alma sing to put her name forward for a variety show in Brighton.

Two years later she came to the attention of bandleader Ted Heath, who pronounced that she had a good voice, but was "far too young for this business." He later said that was one of the biggest mistakes of his life.

Alma studied dress design at art college – bear that fact in mind - and also sung at tea dances, and in musicals and revues. She was talent-spotted while singing during a hotel residency by the HMV label's Walter Ridley, who also became her coach.

Her first single release, To Be Worthy Of You / Would You?, recorded on her birthday, May 19, in 1952, revealed to the world a gorgeous, pure, melodic voice – a bit like a British version of Doris Day. But perhaps it wasn't the catchiest of songs, and it didn't trouble the charts.

However, it did lead to regular appearances on BBC radio, and a slot as resident vocalist on Take It From Here – a popular radio comedy show, written by Frank Muir and Denis Norden, and starring Jimmy Edwards, and which introduced the world to The Glums.

The following year, she had a fit of the giggles while recording If I Had A Golden Umbrella – like you would, I presume. Ah,




hang on, they thought in the studio. Could be onto something, here. A little catch or inflection in her voice, like a laugh, became her trademark, and the Girl With The Giggle legend was born.


Perhaps things were pointing in that direction, but Alma had her first chart hit in 1954 with the novelty song, Bell Bottom Blues (er no, not the same one later made famous by Eric Clapton with Derek And The Dominoes, since you ask). This got to No 4, and there was no looking back.

The bouncy Dreamboat topped the chart the following year, and although only four of Alma's 18 hits were to reach the Top Ten, she won the then all-important annual NME readers' poll as Outstanding British Female Singer four times between 1956 and 1960.

Some of her hits were of the defiantly fun-loving variety – such as 1955's Never Do A Tango With An Eskimo (can that song really have attracted flak in today's PC times for being "racist"? It's a joke, for heaven's sake!), or the similarly ballroom-themed I Can't Tell A Waltz From A Tango (which could have been



written about me watching Strictly, really).



But Alma also enjoyed success with straightforward ballads, conventional cover versions (everybody covered everybodyelse's songs in those days), songs in a rock and roll style, Sinatra songs, Beatles songs, you name it.

Ah, The Beatles. Paul McCartney was said to have first played the melody of Yesterday on Alma's piano, and to also have performed on one of her songs – even if it was only tambourine. And according to the Daily Mail, Alma's sister Sandra – herself briefly linked to McCartney at one time – claimed Alma had a serious romance with John Lennon, which had to be kept secret because of her family's strict Jewish faith.

After her father died, Alma lived with her mother in a lavishly-decorated flat in Kensington High Street, which became a party venue of choice on the celebrity circuit. Regular visitors were said to include no less than Princess Margaret, Noël Coward, Cary Grant, Audrey Hepburn, Michael Caine, Roger Moore, and Bruce Forsyth (nice to see that Strictly connection again) (to see it, nice).

And then there were her dresses. Those early days as a design student clearly came in handy, because she loved to wear dramatic costumes – huge swirly dresses, with hooped skirts and sequins, and figure-hugging tops – often designed by herself, and allegedly never worn twice.

Cliff Richard professes himself baffled as to how big Alma's wardrobe must have been, saying: "My first impression of her was definitely frocks – I kept thinking how many can this woman have? The skirts seemed to be so wide – I don't know where they hung them up!"

Shortly before her tragic early death, Alma had recorded with Rolling Stones manager and Immediate label boss Andrew Loog Oldham, although the tracks have never been released. But who knows what the future might have held if she hadn't been taken from us at such a cruelly young age?



Heacham at Night

A Happy New Year to all readers and may the nights in 2014 be dark and clear.

The King's Lynn & District Astronomy Society and myself thank the hardy people of Heacham who came to Heacham at Night Live on the 8th January. About 30 attended, despite the rain, and the consensus was that the talks made it worthwhile – I am biased. Unfortunately, we could not use the telescopes and I hope another opportunity will be available soon. On the following Saturday the society hosted another Star Gazing Live Event between 2pm and 9pm at Tottenhill. Over 200 turned up for that, an audience encouraged by the clearer skies and the chip van. Jupiter and its moons and our Moon were well



observed. Our society's patron, Henry Bellingham, and the Mayors of King's Lynn and of Downham Market came along. Three Heachamites also showed up having been turned on, so they said, by Heacham at Night Live. The society does have a website and regular talks are given on the second Monday each month. Some might take your fancy – have a look.

Anyway, back to astronomy. My talk was a bit rushed towards the end and I did not give justice to the debate about Pluto, discovered in 1930 by Tombaugh at Flagstaff. Until August 2006 Pluto was the ninth planet of the solar system. In that month the International Astronomy Union demoted it to a dwarf

planet. I have been told that children in school are sometimes told it is a 'star' because it is not a planet. Well, it certainly is not a star, it is a rocky body a little smaller than Mercury and it orbits the sun at a great distance, an average of $3^{1/2}$ billion miles. As it has a very elliptical, egg shaped, orbit, this distance can be about a billion miles more or less than the average.

Pluto spends about 20 of its 248 years journey around the sun inside the orbit of Neptune. Currently it is about 300 million miles beyond Neptune and if you look about two hands widths right of the sun at lunchtime you are looking towards it. This elongated path contributed to its demotion along with the discovery of several similar bodies beyond Pluto; one of these, Eris, is bigger. Two others are named Haumea and Makemake. Collectively these objects are called Plutoids.

The final nail in 'Pluto the planet' was the definition that a planet had to have cleared its orbit of other objects (rocks and so on). This definition is controversial and there is pressure to change it. Many currently designated 'dwarf planets' would then become planets and the solar system would have at least 27 – rather more than the nine you may have learnt about at school. This change may come about when NASA's New Horizons Mission reaches Pluto in 2015. It was launched in 2006, just after Pluto's demotion, as a mission to the last planet – Neptune had been reached by Voyager 2 but no craft has visited Pluto. NASA would certainly like Pluto to be a planet again.

Why all this stuff about Pluto? Well, last year I saw it in the sky over Heacham and have not managed to make it out elsewhere, and a Hubble image of Pluto is my trial logo. The image shows Pluto, it's relatively large moon Charon and two smaller moons Nix and Hydra. Two other moons, Kerberos and Styx, have since

Last issue I told you to look for amazing comets. Well, ISON grazed the sun a tad too close and vanished; Lovejoy was visible as a very, very, faint fuzz through large binoculars just before sunrise but do not be sorry if you missed it.

This month the only planet you will see easily at night remains Jupiter. It rises in the NE as soon as it is dark and, as the earth turns, tracks SW and W. It is visible until dawn. Do have a look at it through the largest aperture binoculars you have or can borrow. Or use a bird spotting scope. Hopefully you will see four points of light (possibly only three) close to Jupiter. These are the Galilean moons which I have written about before: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. The names are given in order of their distance from Jupiter. However, when you observe them their order may appear different depending upon where in their orbit each moon is.

The brightest dot will be Ganymede because that is by far the biggest; with a diameter of 3,270 miles it is larger than Mercury and almost half the size of the Earth. Ganymede has a liquid, iron rich core, a significant magnetic field, water ice and a thin atmosphere containing some oxygen. Callisto is the size of Mercury, is composed of rocks and ice, probably has a subsurface ocean of water and has a very thin atmosphere containing carbon dioxide and oxygen. Io has more volcanoes than any other object in the solar system - 400. Its crust is pulled about by the tidal gravity of giant Jupiter. Plumes of yellow sulphur shoot hundreds of miles into space. Europa is a bit smaller than our Moon but is very reflective as it is smooth, covered in water ice and with an ocean of water likely beneath it. It, too, has a tenuous oxygen atmosphere and is thought to be the most likely place to find extra-terrestrial life within our solar system. Pictures released last month showed huge geysers erupting from the surface. NASA has plans to send a craft called the 'Europa Clipper' to skim water from these and analyse it.

When you look at these points of light think about them as worlds, all different and one, at least, possibly harbouring microscopic life.

What else to look out for? Find Orion (there was a sketch of it last issue). Follow the line of the 'belt' SE and you will come to Sirius, the brightest star in the sky. Using binoculars go south of Sirius 8 moon diameters (how big the moon looks in the sky). You should see M41, an open cluster of stars. If you go north of Sirius you will find another bright star, Procyon. This star, Sirius and Betelgeuse (the star on the NE shoulder of Orion) form the Winter Triangle.

First quarter moon is 6th February, last quarter 22nd February. These are good times to scan the terminator, the line between light and dark, to see crater walls in detail. Do it both nights and you will see both sides of the craters, valleys and other features of the moon along that line.

Just two things more: a good book which is meant for 9-12 year olds but is appropriate for adults who want to find out more about space without getting technical. It is accurate and right up to date (2013) – Professor Astro Cat's Frontiers of Space, Flying Eye Books.

A second 'Heacham at Night Live' will be held at the Old Friend's Hall on Wednesday March 5th, the middle of National Astronomy Week. 7.00pm start if the sky is clear. Viewing will alternate with a talk on Jupiter. 7.30pm start if raining and an additional talk will be provided. Adults £3 including tea/coffee/biscuits. Under 16 free.

The cost of entry for Bespak Mini GEAR is £6.00 for adults, £5.00 for under 16s and £4.00 for under 8s.

Bespak GEAR is subsidising the entry to this year's BMAF Championship so there is no extra charge to enter. Entrants will simply need to input their membership number into the online entry form.

There are generous cash prizes for Bespak GEAR category winners and everyone taking part will receive a quality medal and goody bag.



#HunstantonHour is for all **Businesses** in the district

Social media is constantly evolving and the introduction of practical tools such as the # (now commonly referred to as a Hashtag in the social media realm) helps you to get more of what you want when you use it. Attach # to the front of a word, phrase, or sequence of numbers and characters, and you create an effective keyword or phrase which is searchable within social media. Originating within Twitter, the Hashtag as a practical tool is now applicable in more social media platforms including Facebook and Google+. Hashtags are used to categorise tweet themes to make it easier to follow a conversation thread which may be of interest to you.

Within the Twitter dashboard any phrase or word with # in front of it becomes a live link to the '#Discover' function at Twitter.com and you can easily see which tweets and keywords are trending at a glance.

Rapid and high volume usage of specific hashtags create trending (which is the same as the current hot topic on everyone's lips at that moment). Current breaking news items can develop their own hashtags as the event occurs (ie #Apollotheatre could apply for the roof cave in at the Apollo Theatre but a more specific tag can also be created like #theatreroofcavein). When using the geolocation facility, Twitter's 'Discover' feature will bring you tweets with hashtags targetted at relevant news in and around your own location, in real time! This makes it a powerful communication tool and it is exacty how a comment can go global within hours so be careful when you tweet etc!

A key hashtag now in common usage is the on-line hour (ie #HunstantonHour, #KingsLynnHour, #NorfolkHour). There are many different regions which have their own on line hour. If you want to up your game and on-line marketing profile this is where you need to be on a regular basis.

I recently started #HunstantonHour and now I need more businesses in the Heacham and West Norfolk villages to join in to help promote our little corner of Norfolk. Now what is that

I hear you say! In simple terms, an on-line hour is an opportunity to market and network and it runs on Twitter. It is also an opportunity to promote a current theme or topic to a wider audience. Most recently, the topic was jobs and working in the Heacham area.

We can, and should, join in #KingsLynnHour and #NorfolkHour but wouldn't it be wonderful to make our corner of Norfolk trend on the powerful Twitter platform or at least have a good go at it? It is a powerful marketing tool for our local businesses and it will be all the better if we all participate. Currently there is one #HunstantonHour per week. If this takes off and we can build a team of local businesses who want to really make it fly, we could have two or three at different times and help each other to grow our message to Norfolk, the UK and globally. This is critical for our tourism based businesses.

All you need to take part is an interest in the Heacham area and the surrounding villages. The more active we are the more successful the #HunstantonHour tag becomes and the more effective it is at spreading the word that the area has a lot to offer. Naturally we all have to learn new skills to keep up with this ever-changing world of the internet, but the best way to start is to just dive in and watch what others are doing. Warning over Council Tax scam

Residents are being warned about a potential e-mail scam from a company purporting to be a government-run agency. The email offers a refund on Council Tax.

A west Norfolk resident contacted the council after receiving an e-mail from <u>REFUND@direct.gov.uk</u> advising that she was due a refund on her council tax of £451 due to an overpayment of tax/PAYE. The email claims that the overpaid amount can be reclaimed by completing and submitting the tax return form attached to the message for processing. The contact name is Rodney Williams, Direct Gov Credit Office, Preston.

Jo Stanton, Revenues and Benefits Manager, said: "We are asking residents to be vigilant. These emails are a scam. We would never contact a taxpayer in this way and would urge people receiving emails of this nature to delete them immediately without opening the attachments."

"Residents should be wary about giving out personal details, especially bank details, by email. If anyone is concerned about any correspondence regarding council tax, either by email or post, they should call us direct on 01553 616200."

SALTINGS- REED CUTTING

In early spring last year the Saltings was visited by members of the Scything Association from across the UK. The Scythers tried out different tool designs, some ancient, some homemade, to cut the reeds and in doing so cleared a large area, which was turned into a wide but shallow pond last autumn. In addition, Mark Randall from the North Norfolk Reed Cutters' Association travelled to Heacham in December to cut back another section of the reed bed on the 17 acre site. The machine used not only cut the reeds, but tied them in bundles making it easier for



collection and stacking. This year the Scything Association will be gathering over the weekend of 1-2 March taking up the opportunity to hone their skills, assisting the Parish Council in the management of the Saltings. Anyone is welcome to come along on the Sunday morning between 10am-12noon to either watch the work or volunteer to collect up cut reeds. Richard Brown, the local organiser from Heacham will also be on hand to chat to visitors to explain what is being done and provide ideas on practical uses for the cut reeds. Parish Council Meetings in Brief

Heacham Development: The Council noted that further documents continued to appear on the Borough Council website in connection with the School Road development. The Parish Council had also written to the Planning Officer with concerns about Highways' response to changes to the School Road/Broadway junction proposed by the Developers.

Resignation: The Council accepted the resignation of Mr Christopher Lynn. Mr Lynn had not been able to attend recent meetings due to ill health.

Vehicle Activated Sign: The Parish Council agreed to bid for funds from the Norfolk County Council's partnership scheme to have a "flashing sign" installed in Lamsey Lane to try to reduce the number of vehicles who failed to limit their speed to 30mph.
