Vintage photo of Heacham

With reference to the vintage photo of Malthouse Row that appeared in the June Newsletter, readers may be interested in the following extract which accompanied a photograph of the cottages in Malthouse Row and appeared in a copy of the Dairy News in 1992/1993:-

Malthouse Row (ex-Dormy House (1760's? – 1963)

"The last major chalk cottage structure built in Heacham intended for labourers on south farm lands, removed in 1963. Fourteen joined chalk cottages with a 2 foot carr foundation at base, set at a slight road angle: the first 6 cottages to west; later 8 with granary to east, all with later tie-rods to support a leaning front. Cottage floors two steps below later road level. Granary with cart door and upper input shutter..

Tiger Alley at rear led to Bushel & Strike Inn, then the resort of rival footballers, the Inn later moving to its present site.

The builders who removed the cottages in 1963, reported little deterioration in their structure."

Malthouse Crescent - people living in the road in approx

Mrs Marshall, Mr Dix (son of Johnny Dix), Mr N Ben, Mr D Woods, Mr D Lee, Mr Lake, Mr C Frammingham, Mr L Hudson, Mr B Hudson.

Buildings belonged to Molly Pratt who lived in Cheney Hill at the top – house on its own on the left hand side going out of the village.



Lindsay Bird's Skydive

At last I'm able to give you a final update on Lindsay and Philip's Skydive.

As you know the original skydive date was fixed for 25th October 2013 but, due to weather conditions, this had to be cancelled. Lindsay and a friend of mine, Philip Bridges, were going to do this jump in aid of Changing Faces but managed to rearrange a new date for this to happen. The date was fixed for 10th April 2014 in the hope of better weather.

April soon came around and at last the weather was quite good. We travelled down to Hinton and within an hour of arriving, both Lindsay and Philip were briefed on what would take place and of the safety precautions that would be in place.

About a half hour later they were togged up with their gear and proceeded to the airplane for the jump. The skies had already started to cloud over and there were thoughts that this might be cancelled again but this time they were in luck.

I can't imagine for one minute how they were both feeling about the upcoming event but, as you may well understand, for me being her father my nerves had started to kick in too. The plane took off and it must have taken about twenty minutes for the light aircraft to reach 13.000 feet before I started to see people coming through the clouds. Apparently there were around ten



others who were doing a skydive too, although these were not fundraisers for charity. Eventually, it pointed out to me by one of the airfield officials that my daughter and Philip would be the last two to do the jump. Within a few minutes they were both coming down and I watched with

nervous anticipation to know that they were both safe.

Lindsay was absolutely thrilled by the whole experience and hopes that maybe one day she will be able to have another go at skydiving as she thoroughly enjoyed every minute.

It has taken several weeks for them to gather all of the other

sponsorships in but I'm pleased to be able to inform you at last that a total of £1,444 has been raised for Changing Faces.



Malthouse Row

I refer to the vintage photograph of Malthouse Row which was printed in the June edition of The Newsletter.

I myself lived in one of the top two cottages in the photograph together with my mother and grandparents. Each cottage was allocated an adjoining allotment, and the outside 'privy' contained two toilets – one small and one large! At that time in a block of two cottages, lived the Hudson and Sarsby families.

Behind Malthouse Row was the notorious public house 'Tiger Alley' and it was a routine happening for extreme fighting to break out there on Saturday evenings. The Landlord of the Pub at that time was a Mr Ponfret. He eventually moved out and moved into the 'Bushel & Strike', at which he erected a tall brick wall around the pub and initially concreted a line of broken glass along its top to deter any would be intruders!

A small shop situated at that time at the rear of Tiger Alley was run by the Skoyles family.

When our family moved out of Malthouse Row into the open land known as The Drove, eventually properties were constructed into Lords Lane and Broadway.

Malthouse Row was eventually knocked down and, in its place, Mr Rudd constructed the Abattoir and also a well stocked retail shop. When the Abattoir closed its doors and it too was demolished, we now have Benstead Close.

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THE SONG REMAINS THE SAME Monthly musings on music by Frank Edmonds When California Dreamin' became a reality

It's amazing to think that The Mamas And The Papas' chart career lasted just two years – from 1966 to 1967. Because in that short time the Californian quartet recorded a string of massively popular singles, some of which would become all-time pop classics.

Their songs were characterised by peerless harmony and melody. But not only that, in band leader John Phillips they had a singer, songwriter and arranger with a deftness of touch and inventiveness to rival even Brian Wilson of The Beach Boys.

Think of The Mamas And The Papas and the first person to come to mind is probably the larger-than-life, exuberant and joyful Cass Elliot, possessor of a wonderful powerhouse of a voice. But that's to overlook the gorgeous vocals of Denny

Doherty, whose dulcet tones would be the envy of any harmony group.

Even Michelle Phillips – who by her own admission, if somewhat harshly, felt she didn't have that much of a voice – was capable of sprinkling magic onto a song. The archetypal tall, willowly Californian blonde, and a model before she met and married John Phillips, her breathy, yearning, semi-spoken introduction to Dedicated To The One I Love has been described as one of the most memorable intros in Sixties pop.

In fact Michelle has said that part of the band's secret was that the relative weakness of her voice caused the much more powerful Cass to rein in her own vocals a little, creating a much more rounded sound.

Despite their career taking off in California, and the group becoming archetypal of the West Coast harmony sound, only Michelle was actually born there. John came from South Carolina, and Cass (born Ellen Naimoi Cohen) was from Virginia, while Denny hailed from Nova Scotia in Canada.

All had gravitated to New York's Greenwich Village folk scene, Denny and Cass coming from the oddly-named group the

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Mugwumps, before they decided to try their luck in California. Eve Of Destruction hitmaker Barry McGuire introduced them to legendary record producer Lou Adler, and the rest as they say is history.

And that's a history beautifully told in one of The Mamas And The Papas' hit singles, Creeque Alley, which paints a detailed and brilliantly witty picture of the emerging pop scene of the time, and some of its key players.

"In a coffee house Sebastian sat, and after every number they passed the hat," paints a vivid picture of the struggling early days of the ultimately very successful singer-songwriter John Sebastian, before he formed The Lovin' Spoonful and had international hits with the likes of Summer In The City.

Lyrics like: "McGuinn and McGuire couldn't get no higher, but that's what they were aiming at," are obvious on one level, but on another, it's also a subtle reference to Roger McGuinn's band The Byrds' single Eight Miles High. Ah! And what's not to love about lines like: "Broke, busted, disgusted, agents can't be trusted"!

Not that Phillips' songwriting was always universally loved – even within the band itself. John admitted he didn't really know what the words to Monday, Monday were about – and all three fellow members thought the song faintly ridiculous.

Mercifully they were persuaded to record it – and it was a No 3 hit in the UK and a No 1 in the US. I don't see the problem, myself – personally I love lines like: "Monday, Monday, can't trust that day," or "Monday, Monday, how could you leave and not take me"!


Going back to the aforementioned Barry McGuire, when they first got together, The Mamas And The Papas acted as backing singers on one of his albums. They took a shine to one song, and with the simple expediency of erasing McGuire's lead vocal and replacing it with one by Denny Doherty, released it as a single. Lo and behold, California Dreamin' was their first hit!



In fairness, John and Michelle had written the song. But no one remembers McGuire's version, do they? And that's a testament to John's skill as an arranger, and the vocal talents at his disposal within his own group.

As the song starts, Denny sings: "All the leaves are brown," and then he pauses, while the girls repeat the line, slowly and more stridently. Then Denny continues: "And the sky is grey," and again the girls follow. And so the song continues.

It's a simple but effective musical trick, contrasting the lead vocal with a kind of choral counterpoint that's so catchy it just makes you want to sing along. It's a cornerstone of The Mamas



And The P a p a s ' approach to melody and arrangement that makes their songs so memorable.

Memorable in a completely different way – if you knew the inside story – was their hit I Saw Her Again.

Debut album, If You Can Believe Your Eyes And Ears

On the face of it, just another love song about a new romance. In fact, it was written by John about bandmate Denny having a fling with Phillips' wife Michelle. In this context, "I saw her again last night" takes on a whole new meaning. John cheerfully admitted that seeing the song become a hit and making the embarrassed pair sing it each night on stage was his own form of revenge!

Part of the reason the band captured the public's imagination was their image, as a disparate group of four distinct individuals – rake-thin, toweringly tall and eternally be-hatted John, his quiet hippy-chick wife Michelle, beautiful and "angelic when she wants to be," good-looking Denny, the "master of the sarcastic one-liner," and the irrepressible and charming Cass, with a personality as big as her dress size.

Perhaps it just couldn't last. After briefly burning so bright, the band imploded and split up. Cass went on to achieve solo success, with two big hits at the end of the Sixties, It's Getting Better, and Dream A Little Dream Of Me. Sadly, she died of a heart attack, suddenly and unexpectedly, in 1974, aged just 32. Michelle pursued a successful acting career, and after divorcing John was briefly married to actor and director Dennis Hopper.



John continued to write and arrange, while battling the twin rock-star devils of drink and drugs, with mixed success; having written the flower-power anthem San Francisco (Be Sure To Wear Flowers In Your Hair) for Scott McKenzie, he later co-wrote the Beach Boys' classic Kokomo. He died of heart failure, aged 65, in 2001.

The Phillips' daughter, Chynna, was a singer in Nineties chart band Wilson Phillips, along with Brian Wilson's daughters Carnie and Wendy. Two of John's daughters from other marriages, Mackenzie Phillips and Bijou Phillips, are actresses. Denny – who declined Cass' offer of marriage after the group split up – forged a solo career, surprisingly without any real success. He died in 2007, aged 66.

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The Kitchen Gardener



July – mid-summer. Flea beetle blues, how to save your supper if air raids come and food memories from a Swedish sheep farmer.

I do believe I have the entire flea beetle population of Norfolk in my brassica patch. If the plants are growing away strongly they will often survive but a heavy infestation on young plants can be a serious problem. They nibble away at the leaves – first signs are tiny round holes – this weakens the plants and if they reach the central growing point, the plant will die. They will decimate a row of radishes in no time at all, and one year they destroyed three sowings of swede, at which point I had to accept it wasn't going to feature on that winter's menu.

Pyrethrum dust works to a degree but the moment it rains the beetles return. After dusting for the third time in as many (showery) days I suddenly remembered a tip I read a year or so ago. The gardener had greased some postcard sized pieces of cereal packet and wafted them over infested plants, as the beetles jumped up they stuck to the card.

I found some unused grease-bands in the shed and with an old pair of gardening gloves, set to. It was a highly effective method of entrapment; it has to be done at arms length - any closer and they hop it.

I found I was needing to do this a couple of times a day and, wondering if there was anything else I could try, consulted Doctor Google. Sorting the wheat from the chaff I had a go at hand held vacuum removal. It's a much easier way of doing the same thing as sticky paper or card and much greater numbers can be caught. I've re-sown some purple sprouting, which has suffered most, but fear the plants will go in too late to establish before winter sets in.

My precious wartime cookery book really brings the era alive for me. The introduction explains it is written for a time of changed circumstances – some households may have grown a great deal with children from other families sharing meals, while others may have dwindled to adults only or even one harassed father who has to cook his own meals and then do his own washing up.

It offers recipes for nourishing sandwiches for ARP workers, cakes made without currants, puddings without sugar and emergency cooking. It hopes that with the recipes the reader can face wartime bravely and confidently, full of hope for happier days to come.

If interrupted by an air raid warning the first thing to do is to turn off the power or close the dampers of the kitchen range. Leave the oven doors closed so the meal can continue cooking.

When you return to the kitchen you can gauge if the oven needs restarting to finish off cooking. Spoiled steamed puddings are broken up with a fork, mixed with brown sugar, syrup or marmalade and re-steamed. A cake can be baked for longer if still damp and sticky.

If heavy when cut, it is recycled into a steamed pudding with pieces of cake, cocoa, milk, sugar and egg. Alternatively, it becomes a baked sultana cake pudding very similar to our familiar bread and butter pudding – effectively cake baked in an egg custard with sultanas.

In bold type the book says 'on no account throw any food away if there is any way at all of using it'.

Over the coming month I'll be staying on top of the weeding and watering. I'll be feeding the tomatoes and figs with comfrey tea, I'll be starting to summer prune the espalier fruit and any over

vigorous bush trees, and sowing the main winter carrots. I'll also be busy preserving – by various means – any spare summer produce to expand the winter larder.

I had a very interesting food memory sent to me by my Swedish pen pal along with a photocopy of the original (1959) newspaper article used by her mother and now by her.

'Three good dinners for 15 krona'.

Friday: vegetable soup and cheese sandwiches.

Saturday: meat casserole with horseradish, cooked potatoes and salads.

Sunday: marinaded cold meat with green beans, tomato salad and mashed potatoes.

All this was done with a 2kg beef brisket, very slow cooked on the Friday with water, salt, peppercorns, onions and carrots. The meat is cooked until it comes away from the bone and is very tender.

Half of the bouillon is saved for the Saturday, the rest has plenty of vegetables added to make the Friday soup which is served with plenty of chopped parsley. Saturday's casserole is made with half of the meat simmered in a bechamel, with lots of finely grated horseradish added at the end of cooking. I'm fascinated by how different food cultures eat similar combinations - horseradish with beef for us and the Swedes but not the French - yet the Norman invasion gave us some new ways with food.

The rest of the cooked meat became the Sunday marinade. Cut into cubes it was marinaded in a mixture of oil, dark vinegar, soy, 2 cloves of crushed garlic and 4 roughly crushed allspice corns. The meat is marinaded overnight but will keep in the fridge for at least two or three days. The only way my friend has adjusted the recipe is to serve potato salad instead of mash, and to add a lot more garlic and allspice.

It's always a big hit with her family and guests so it will pass down the line, no doubt. I didn't need Sunday's dessert translated – chokladpudding.

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1st Heacham Cubs

We started this term by making salt crystals and then the preparations for the Cub Camp

began. The Cubs drew round their hands and we put a letter on each one to spell out Heacham Cubs. These were then hung up around the archway to the entrance of our camp site at the West Norfolk Rugby Club in North Wootton. Harry Toop was invested before we went on camp.

Many thanks to Julie (Ziggy), Sam (Chil), Michael (Rama), Lindsay, Bethany, Jack, Barry, Oliver, Simon and Jemma who came up on Thursday 12th June and took all the kit up and set up the marquee and tents.



Camp started at 7.00pm on Friday 13th June with the Cubs arriving in uniform and setting up their beds and sorting their equipment. They then joined 123 Cubs and 20 Scouts and Explorers from 11 different packs from North West Norfolk for the

As per usual, even though the weather forecast was for fine dry weather, it started to rain at 4.00am and was still drizzling at 8.00am. Cubs were up at 7.00am and breakfast was at 8.00am with the same as Saturday being on offer. Cub's Own was at 9.30am when the Cubs heard the story of Jack Cornwell, a Scout who joined the Navy at 16 during WW1 and was a gunner on HMS Chester during the Battle of Jutland. He was wounded by a shell splinter but refused to leave his post until he was relieved at the end of the battle. He later died of his wounds and was awarded the Victoria Cross posthumously at the age of 16. He was also awarded the Bronze Cross, the highest Scouting award at the time. To commemorate the courage shown by Jack, the Scout Association created "The Cornwell Scout Badge" in his memory to be given for gallantry given in adverse conditions.

At 10.30am all the Cubs played Camponoply where they all go round in teams and complete different tasks earning points along the way from 4 for trying, to 10 to completing the task fully. While the Cubs were playing Camponoply, (Jemma (Hathi) and Jack (Mang) ran our base for us. We were able to take the tents down and start tidying up between showers. Lunch was at 1.00pm and the closing ceremony was at 2.45pm with the Cubs leaving at 3.00pm.



We are proud to say one of our teams won Camponoply so Well Done to Kieran Chick, Nathaniel Linsell, Joel Alway, Samuel Witton and Harry Toop who all shared a box of sweets.

Also, a huge Well Done to Nathaniel Linsell

who won Cub of the Camp for taking a new Cub under his wing

Heacham at Night



Heacham at Night Live 3, at the end of May, was a failure as far as attendance goes — only 6 of you turned up. By request it was held on a Friday as it would be late before the night could get sufficiently dark. The sky was clear and the enthusiastic few saw Saturn's rings, Jupiter's moons and a good look at Mars. They also learnt a lot about Saturn.

Financially, this meeting made a loss but the three meetings overall have broken even so the King's Lynn and District Astronomy Society, which supports these events, is still prepared to put on several more in the autumn. Each event does rely on people bringing telescopes and other equipment from King's Lynn and beyond so it would be nice to have some feedback about future attendance.

Anyway – July nights. Hopefully some of them will be clear or at least better than many in June which, at the time of writing, are overcast, cool and a bit draughty. By the end of July, nights are also beginning to darken a little earlier.

No bright planets this month as Mars is now low in the SW. On 5th July it is close to the Moon and the star Spica. Saturn will lie further south and a little higher in the sky.

Jupiter has more or less vanished in the direction of the sun but it is worth trying to spot it from Heacham beaches. On the 6th July, the date of the Heacham Beach Party, between 6pm and 8pm you will find Jupiter just to the left of the Sun at about the 10 o'clock position. Use just your eyes and shade them from the Sun with your hand. By the 24th July Jupiter's orbit will have taken it behind the Sun from our perspective. It will be at conjunction with the Sun and a straight line drawn from the

Earth through the Sun will also pass through Jupiter. On the 31st July, Jupiter will emerge from behind the Sun at about the 4 o'clock position.

In 6 months' time the Earth will be half way round the sun, from its current position, and on the same side of the Sun as Jupiter (Jupiter will have advanced just a short way in its orbit as it takes 12 Earth years to go around the Sun). January will find Jupiter low down in the east. In February and March it will once again be shining bright high in the sky and I will be reminding you about the Galilean moons.

Saturn will be low in the south all month but it will still be possible to see the rings through a telescope. On the 31st July go down to the beaches about 9pm and you will find the moon low in the west. In a line to the SSW, inclining upwards to about 20 degrees above the horizon you will find Spica, then Mars, then Saturn. Wait an hour, the moon will go below the horizon and the two planets will appear brighter in the darkening sky.

Both Venus and Mercury are pre-dawn objects in July and require a good east horizon. They are close together on the 18th. Wait until August and observing will be better for both – put the 18th August in your diary as Venus and Jupiter will appear to be almost on top of each other.

Uranus and Neptune appear in the early hours during the month and are usefully visible from about midnight towards the end of it. Uranus is in the SSE and about 15 degrees above the horizon. Good binoculars should spot the blue dot. Neptune is SE about 23 degrees up but needs a telescope. Remember these planets are a long way away, Uranus 20x as far as the Sun, Neptune 29x. It is nice to spot such distant planetary members of our solar system.

The moon is always worth looking at. Best times this month are in the first week and in the last two weeks. The moon is full on the 12th July and details get washed out by the light. However, between the 10th and the 13th the moon is close to the horizon and an optical illusion will make it look much larger than usual. Look S to ESE from about 9pm.

There is a meteor shower between 28th and 30th July – the Delta Aquarids. The moon is fading and sets early so have a look for them around midnight.

Earlier, I mentioned the Heacham Beach Party on the 6th July. Depending on what else I might have to do and on the weather, I hope to have several telescopes close to the beach (likely the car park) with appropriate filters so you can see if there are any sunspots and /or try and spot Jupiter.

A reminder - Professor Gerry Gilmore from the Institute of Astronomy, Cambridge, talks about the GAIA space mission on Friday 12th September at 7.30pm. It is at King's Lynn Academy so parking will be free. Tickets are £5 and available from the end of June – contact me.

Last night, 18th June, was clear but it was 1am before many stars could be seen. Saturn gave a good show with Titan visible as a spark beside it. A quarter Moon came up about 1.45am and washed out the sky as the chilly night turned misty. It was an opportunity to get my new mount better aligned and I also got my old telescope operational again. The dog took an interest so is still asleep at 9am whilst I complete this.

Keep looking up.

Individual Electoral Registration (IER)

This year's annual registration exercise starts on 4th August and, for the first time, everyone will be responsible for their own registration. This is called Individual Electoral Registration (IER) and replaces the previous system which allowed one member of a household to register everyone who lived at their address.

All currently registered electors will have their name and address checked against government records. Those whose details are confirmed will automatically transfer to the IER register without having to do anything and will be notified. Anyone whose details cannot be confirmed will also be notified and asked to provide additional information in order to be registered under IER.

Households where nobody is currently registered will be sent a Household Enquiry Form (HEF). The purpose of this is to ask whether anyone in the house needs to register. If so, they will then be sent an Invitation to Register (ITR). Their details will then also be checked against government records before they can be registered.

The Electoral Registration Officer would very much appreciate householders' co-operation in making the change to IER as smooth as possible by promptly responding to any form received. In the event that anyone in a household receives neither confirmation of automatic transfer to IER, a HEF nor an ITR, he/she will need to contact the Electoral Helpline on 01553 616773.

This will particularly apply to young people approaching the age of 18 but could also apply to anyone who has joined a household but not yet registered.

Dates & Deadlines!

1 July - Savings:

New Individual Savings Accounts (NISAs) come into force, with new limits and increased investment flexibility. The NISA annual savings limit will be £15000 and the Junior ISA limit increases to £4000. All existing ISAs become NISAs. From 1 July, NISA savings can be wholly in cash, or stocks and shares, or a mixture. Transfers can be made between stocks and shares, NISAs and cash NISAs.

5 July - Non-Resident Landlords:

Deadline for 2013/14 returns of rent paid by agents to non-resident landlords and of tax deducted by tenants from rents paid direct to non-resident landlords.

6 July - PAYE:

Deadline for employers to file Forms P11D, P9D and P11D(b) for 2013/14. This deadline is strictly enforced and penalties are generated automatically.

Deadline for employers to give copies or summaries of Forms P11D and P9D to employees.

Employers: an employer who has provided a redundancy package in 2013/14 worth more than £30,000 and which included benefits-in-kind, must report it to HMRC.

Employers: deadline for a close company to elect that all beneficial loans to a director be treated as a single loan for calculating 2013/14 benefits in kind.

Employers: deadline to file Form 42 for 2013/14, the return of reportable events in connection with unapproved share schemes.

14 July - Company Accounts:

Due date for CT61 return for quarter to 30 June 2014.

19 or 22 July - PAYE:

Due dates to pay Class 1A NICs for 2013/14. Payments by cheque should reach HMRC by 19 July; electronic payments must have cleared into the HMRC bank account by 22 July.

31 July - Income Tax:

A Self Assessment Tax Return for 2012/13 not filed online by 31 July 2014, will attract a tax-geared penalty, the higher of £300 and 5% of the liability at 31 January 2014.

Income Tax: due date for second Self Assessment payment on account for 2013/14. Failure to make this payment will result in automatic interest charges being levied.

Tax Credits: renewal deadline to provide information to finalise 2013/14 awards and renew claims for 2014/15.

Company Accounts: private companies with 31 October 2013 year ends, should file their accounts at Companies House by this date.

Corporation Tax: company returns for accounting periods ended 31 July 2013, should reach HMRC.

1 August - Income Tax:

Deadline to pay outstanding Self Assessment Tax and Class 4 NICs for 2012/13 to avoid a second 5% penalty being levied on 2 August 2014 (the first was on 2 March 2014).

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DO YOU HAVE INCOME FROM PROPERTY?.....

PART III: FOREIGN MATTERS

In our previous articles we have covered the basics of tax on property income, whether from a **Furnished Holiday Let** (FHL) or a residential "**buy to let**" (often on six month **Assured Shorthold Tenancies** (ASTs). However, with the opening up of Europe and the proliferation of cheap flights, many people now own properties outside of the UK which they let when not being used for personal holidays, or hold a portfolio of houses in a popular overseas tourist area.

There is a common misconception that, provided that no monies are brought back to the UK, foreign income or gains are not the concern of HM Revenue & Customs and do not therefore need to be declared. However, unless you are not domiciled in the UK (a legal status which defines your tax "home" and is outside of the scope of this article) then you are required to disclose your worldwide income and gains to the UK Tax authorities.

In practice this means that if you have income from a property that you let out which is situated outside of the UK then the income, less running expenses, needs to be declared on your UK Self Assessment Tax Return. If the property is in the European Economic Area (EEA) which comprises the 28 member states of the European Union plus Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway (but does NOT include Switzerland) then, provided it would qualify as a Furnished Holiday Let (available for holiday let for a minimum of 210 days and actually let for at least 105 days), the more generous Income Tax treatment, capital allowances and favourable Capital Gains Tax (CGT) treatment available to UK FHLs are also available for the foreign equivalent. If situated outside of the EEA then the income is simply treated as Property Income and disclosed on the Foreign pages of the Return.

Any net income generated will be added to your other income of the tax year and UK tax applied in the normal way. Depending on the Country in question and any **Double Taxation Treaty** in place between their Government and the UK, it is usually possible to offset any foreign tax paid on the income in the host country against the equivalent UK tax so that the income is only taxed once over all.

If you are in the position of having moved abroad to live yourself, and are now letting out your UK property(ies) as a **Non Resident Landlord**, you may find that you are having Basic Rate Tax (at 20%) deducted at source from your rents receivable, either by your letting agent or in certain circumstances by the tenant. This can cause a significant cash flow problem and is therefore an incentive to ensure that your tax affairs are kept under review. If you take the correct advice this can be avoided.

In 2010 it was estimated that there were in the region of 55,000 FHLs owned by UK Taxpayers in the EEA but the income from a number of these was not being declared and taxed, under the Self Assessment regime. This is clearly a significant leakage of tax from the Treasury and HM Revenue and Customs are currently using a "carrot and stick" approach to encourage tax payers to put their tax affairs in order. The main thrust of this approach is the various "Campaigns" targeting, most recently, rental income, second incomes and overseas income.

The Campaigns share much in common, and ask the Taxpayer to make full disclosure of the various income that has not been previously declared going back up to 20 years and, in return for

this, the Taxpaver pays a significantly reduced level of penalties than would otherwise be the case if HM Revenue & Customs were to become aware of the errors as a result of receiving third party information for example or enquiry. HM Revenue & Customs may also be open to accepting a payment plan for any tax outstanding as, if the mis-declaration has gone on for a number of years, it is quite possible that funds are not available to pay the outstanding amount in a single payment. In addition, if a full declaration is made, then the acceptance by HM Revenue & Customs of the Taxpayer's offer gives both sides certainty of their position and income can be correctly declared and tax paid into the future. It is worth noting that, typically, if there has been a history of undeclared income and this is NOT declared via a Campaign but instead discovered by HM Revenue & Customs, then the resulting tax, penalties and interest often amount to all, or even more, than the funds accumulated as a result of the non-declaration. A strong encouragement to "come clean" and bring one's affairs bang up to date rather than storing up problems for yourself later, or even for your beneficiaries upon vour demise.

HM Revenue & Customs have also been successful, especially in the EU, in persuading foreign tax authorities to disclose details of income that they hold from returns of Banks and letting agents in their own territories that could identify non-declaration in the UK. Behind the scenes they are undertaking a programme of **matching intelligence from all over the world** with the tax records held by HM Revenue & Customs with the resulting list of potential non-declaration being a valuable starting point for launching enquiries into UK Taxpayers' affairs. It is very much a case of making a disclosure to HM Revenue & Customs before they come calling themselves and seeking the assistance of an experienced professional is the most sensible option.

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Local history and archaeology? We are still digging! This year will be the *nineteenth season* for the Sedgeford Historical and Archaeological Research Project (SHARP), the long term archaeological and historical look into the past of Sedgeford, recording the story of the village since man first came to live there.

The 'dig' season is from Sunday 6th July to Friday 15th August 2014, and visitors are very welcome, free of charge, from Sunday to Friday between 10am and 4pm. (Please note we are closed on Saturdays) with an extended tour every Friday at 3.30pm, conducted by the various supervisors.

During the season we have Tuesday night lectures on archaeology at Sedgeford Church, beginning on **8th July** and the last one **12th August.** These commence at 7.30pm and usually end by 9.00pm at the latest. Entry is free, donations are welcome and go to the church.

As this year is the publication date of the first major report on the dig, the talks will be relevant to both Sedgeford and SHARP since it began in 1996.

We are once again running our 'Dig for a Day' Course. You can book via the website as many have done already. Cost

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

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HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

June Meetings in Brief

Boundary Changes: The Council had asked the Clerk to investigate when the boundary between Hunstanton and Heacham had changed. The Clerk reported that she had sought advice from the Norfolk Record Office and had borrowed a collection of ordnance survey maps to examine.

Sea Defences: The Council noted Cllr Manning's report that meetings would shortly take place to discuss how the sea defences would be maintained in the future. The Council noted with disappointment that a proportion of the funding would have to be found locally.

Annual Return: The Council reviewed the Annual Return presented by the Clerk. The Return was approved and would be sent to the Auditor Mazars before the deadline of 4 July. Notices about the accounts and electors' rights of inspection had already been posted.

Signs: The Council noted that there had been a proliferation of signs along the A149 on verges and private land. The Clerk was asked to make reports to the Borough and County Council.

Heacham In Bloom: The Council joined the Chairman in wishing the team good luck with the judging on 9 July.

Hogweed: The Council noted that further treatment had been carried out at the Saltings to eradicate the invasive plant.

Speeding: The Council gave the go ahead for a vehicle activated sign, alerting drivers to their speed, to be erected in Lamsey Lane. Norfolk County Council would carry out the work and the Parish Council would meet 50% of the cost.

FOOTPATHS

The Parish Council urges drivers not to park on the footpaths in the village. Parking on the footpath or verge can seem the best option to keep the road clear. However, footpaths must be kept unobstructed for pedestrians. Many pedestrians have pushchairs, prams or wheelchairs and having to move into the road to pass a parked car or van is not acceptable.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Parish Council has been granted a licence to treat Greylag Goose and Mallard Duck eggs. The licence permits the Council to treat nests on private property in the village, but only at the invitation of the property owner.

The Parish Council's policy of humane management is not a quick fix, but with Parishioners' support of its no feeding request, current numbers can be controlled and the flock can be maintained at naturally sustainable balance.

The Parish Council continues to urge residents not to feed the ducks or geese. This is particularly important to prevent mother ducks bringing ducklings off the ponds and onto the roads.


