

The Heacham Squeeze

Planning application 14/01022/FM | Erection of 166 dwellings, including construction of a new access road, landscaping works and public open space | Land South of Hunstanton, Norfolk

This has just gone on-line. Last date for objections is 14th August. Why object? Amongst other reasons, the sole access is from Hunstanton Road, Heacham. Traffic leaving the proposed development is most likely to exit the A149 at Heacham traffic lights. A Hunstanton development but both the traffic and sewage heads our way. Object to the Borough Council and, if you can, to everyone else – Parish, County and MP.

Planning application 13/01541/OM.

This is the School Road one again. Rejected by you, the Parish Council and the Borough Council, twice. Now the application is going to appeal – developers have more rights than you do. So object again, **strongly**. Details of how to object should be available before this is published by which time you will have only about 3 weeks to do so. Amongst other issues, traffic problems caused by this proposal would badly affect the School Road, Broadway, Lords Lane junction.

If both applications went through then the traffic caused by the first would meet that caused by the second – most likely at the Nourse Drive, Lynn Road junction just before the traffic lights.



Large Developments - News Update Planning Application 14/01022/FM- 166 New Homes

A planning application has been submitted by Hopkins Homes for 166 homes by Redgate Hill, Hunstanton. The only vehicular access in and out of the new estate will be onto Hunstanton Road in Heacham. This proposal if passed will significantly impact the Redgate Hill junction onto the A149 and increase the levels of traffic on Hunstanton Road leading to the Village. Have your say at www.west-norfolk.gov.uk/Planning by 14 August. Full plans are available from the Parish Council Office.

Planning Appeal 14/00036/REF **Broadlands Housing** An appeal has been lodged against KL&WN Borough Council's refusal of the application for outline permission for the construction of a care home, housing with care facilities and 70 new homes. New allotments, associated landscaping, **SUDS** ponds and associated works including an electricity substation and a pumping



station are also proposed. Access off School Road. At the time of going to press the details of the appeal were still being validated, but it is expected that the consultation period, which last for 5 weeks will start in early August. Comments about the application must be made directly to the Planning Inspectorate



The New Girl at St Mary's Church!

I am delighted to be writing this piece for the Heacham Newsletter and wish to begin by saying a huge THANK YOU for the welcome my family and I have received since we have moved to Heacham. We are loving being part of this friendly and busy and village, look forward to being part of you for many years to come.

For my first sermons here I have been using words from the Bible, Ecclesiastics chapter 3 verses 1-14, the wellknown passage which



talks of there being a time for everything. Here is part of what I said:

I suspect many of you have many different feelings and thoughts about me being appointed as your priest in charge, about what the future may hold for this church, community and village, about what 'the vicar will change', about having a woman as your vicar!

I am certain that God has called me to be here with you in Heacham. I don't know why, I don't know what he wants me to do, I don't know how long he wants me here, but I do know he has called. You prayed, we prayed, and God has sent me. There may be more gifted, more talented, more godly people who could have been your Priest in charge, but God has called me, with my gifts, my experience, my faults and my frailties.... he called me to work and worship with you, with all your gifts and experience, faults and frailties.

We are beginning our season or time for working and worshipping together. As the reading from Ecclesiastes implies, there will be good times and hard times, times when we will laugh together, and times when we cry, times when we agree with each other and times when we don't, times when things go well and times when they go badly... times of great joy and times of great pain, there will be times when I/you get things right and times when we get things wrong.

I am completely delighted to be here with you, I am excited about what God has in store for us, I am thrilled that he called me to serve him, you in the church and the wider community here, I am realistic about how hard and how good it will be at times, but also secure in knowing that whatever happens, God is with us.

With my prayers and best wishes for August and beyond.



To qualify for a Flu Vaccination you will need to fall into the following category:

YOU ARE OVER 65, OR SUFFER FROM:-ASTHMA/BREATHING PROBLEMS, CYSTIC FIBROSIS, HEART DISEASE, **DIABETES, KIDNEY DISEASE** WEAK IMMUNE SYSTEM, LIVER DISEASE, **NEUROLOGICAL DISEASE** CARERS WHO LOOK AFTER PHYSICALLY DISABLED, OR A DEPENDANT PERSON, PREGNANT.

For Children who qualify for flu jab and as a reminder to parents if you are unable to bring your child on the day, but another family member attends on your behalf, we will require written consent from you to enable our staff to proceed with the flu jab.

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THE SONG REMAINS THE SAME Monthly musings on music by Frank Edmonds

So does the song really remain the same?

For Led Zeppelin fans, it was the Holy Grail – all the band's studio albums not only remastered by no less than Zep's founder, guitarist and producer Jimmy Page, but ... get this ... each with a bonus disc of previously unissued material from the vaults!

New Zep stuff we haven't heard before! How great is that? Answer: when you're talking about the greatest rock band ever to walk the earth, potentially very great indeed!

Ah, but would that potential be fulfilled? Was the extra stuff actually any good – or was there a very good reason it had remained unreleased for 45 years? And did the new remasters really make it worth buying the original albums all over again?

This deluxe reissue campaign kicked off with the first three albums – the imaginatively-titled Led Zeppelin and Led Zeppelin II (both originally from 1969) and Led Zeppelin III (1970).

So do the remasters sound any better?

I fear we're in emperor's new clothes territory, here. If Jimmy Page himself has remastered them, then they've got to be better, right? But if you're not a serious audiophile, with expensive equipment to match, or have a recording engineer's ears, can you REALLY tell? (and if you do have a recording engineer's ears, can you just give them back?!).

To put this to the test, I put the opening track of each of the three albums on my iPod, remaster first, then original, bunged the headphones on, and whacked up the volume.

Hey – Good Times Bad Times sounds crisper and clearer! Oh, wait a minute ... that's the ordinary version, not the remaster! Blast! But does the guitar have more crunch on the remaster ... or am I just willing it to have?

With Whole Lotta Love, I found myself leaping for the volume control when the guitar solo came on ... just because I love the guitar solo. I did that on both versions, actually. I flicked back to the beginning and listened carefully when the bass rumbled in ... and oh dear, I think I preferred the old version there, too.

Well what about The Immigrant Song? Whacking the volume up really loud now, until I could almost see the Viking hordes in my living room, I marvelled anew at how Bonzo's crashing cymbals sounded like a longship surging through the waves, and Percy's banshee wail sounded like rape and pillage was imminent. Which it generally was. But could I tell which version I preferred? No I could not.

Well I kind of thought I preferred the remaster this time, but I really wasn't sure. Valhalla I am coming ... to buy a hearing aid

Crikes alive. Maybe I should just keep both versions, eh?

All right, then – so what about those bonus discs ...

Because their debut album was recorded in just 36 hours, an extra disc's worth of unused material was always looking a tad hopeful. So instead we get live tracks from a performance at the Paris Olympia later that year – in fact just before the release of Led Zeppelin II, and featuring two tracks from that album.

And what a wild beast of a concert this is! The band don't so much perform as unleash themselves on the unsuspecting audience. Robert Plant's animal roar at the start of Good Times Bad Times goes on so long the band give up and go straight into Communication Breakdown instead. Communication Breakneck, more like!

John Paul Jones' inventive bass and John Bonham's thunder of drums are rock solid beneath the bedlam, allowing Plant and Page to make mayhem over the top. It's thrilling stuff. And you can hear more of the words too, which is nice!

This primal attack continues with an intense and impassioned I Can't Quit You Baby, leaving you frankly exhausted after the first two songs — and we're only 11 minutes in. Then Heartbreaker is followed by two Page showpieces, Dazed And Confused, and the acoustic White Summer/Black Mountain Side (which, in truth, goes on a bit).

You Shook Me gives way to a nine-minute Moby Dick (I think you have to like drum solos – fortunately I do), before a blistering How Many More Times finishes it all off – and you too, quite possibly.

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FAMILIES WELCOME

OK, maybe sometimes these longer live versions outstay their welcome a bit, but at other times they're really exciting. And they give a wonderful glimpse of how powerful the band were, even early on. Well worth having.

The bonus discs for the second and third albums are interesting – even fascinating, at times – but a good deal less thrilling, it has to be said.

Of the eight tracks that supplement Led Zeppelin II, half are "rough mix with vocal" versions of album tracks. Whole Lotta Love, for instance, has basic guitar only, without the solo, only a rough vocal, and the famous middle bit with all the funny noises is seriously underdeveloped. Hmmm. Other rough mixes ... don't sound so wildly different from the finished versions, really.

And three other tracks are backing tracks only – so Thank You just sounds like a lot of church organ, Living Loving Maid a curiously naked set of guitar riffs, and drum solo Moby Dick a positively bizarre intro and outro ... without the drum solo in the middle! (don't say "Good!").

Fascinating glimpses into the studio process, yes. Essential? We-e-ell, not really.

Then there's a brand new track – yay! – an instrumental, called La La. Er, right. Actually, it's not bad, in an oddly Sixties pop kind of way – but that's as close as we get to actual "new" material.

And it's a similar story on Led Zeppelin III's bonus disc. There are rough/alternate/not-really-substantially-different mixes of The Immigrant Song, Celebration Day, Gallows Pole, and That's The Way.

There are three backing tracks without the vocals. Friends, I have to say, sounds wonderfully spooky. Bathroom Sound is just an early version of Out On The Tiles with, yes, no vocals. And Jennings Farm Blues is actually an electric version of Bron-Y-Aur Stomp – an oddity, sure, but nowhere near as good as the classic acoustic version.

Much more worthwhile is a completely different take of Since I've Been Loving You, with different lead guitar and vocals – this is seriously terrific.

And that leaves us with a medley-cum-studio-jam of two old blues standards, Key To The Highway/Trouble In Mind. Which is, er, OK.


So, I'm afraid, my advice would be to check out or download all of the concert tracks from the first bonus disc ... and just La La from the second, and Since I've Been Loving You from the third. Unless you're insufferably curious ... or a Zep addict like me!

By the time the band made their next three albums – Led Zeppelin IV, Houses Of The Holy, and Physical Graffiti – they were beginning to stockpile songs more. So I'm hopeful that the bonus discs of the next three deluxe remasters will prove a lot more interesting. An alternate Stairway To Heaven, anyone? A different version of Kashmir? Or will The Song, truly, Remain The Same?

Well, I'm hopeful. Mind, I was hopeful England might have done a deal better than getting knocked out of the World Cup after just the two games ...

Heacham at Night

A shorter article this time. Not that the sky is any smaller but earthly demands have arisen.

So, August – conjunctions, meteors and, perhaps, a comet (or perhaps not).

You will remember that a conjunction is when two heavenly bodies appear close to each other in the sky. If you can find a NE horizon at 5am on the 2nd and 3rd, then you may see Mercury and Jupiter close to the horizon and west of the sun (take care). Venus will be well above them and to the east. Mercury is, of course, relatively close to the sun and Jupiter currently very far beyond it. They are only close as seen from your viewpoint on the Earth.

Messenger, the NASA Mercury orbiter, has now completed well over 3000 orbits of Mercury amassing huge amounts of data about it. It will be allowed to impact the surface about March next year when the mission will end.

Between the 16th and 18th August, again NE and at 5am, Jupiter and Venus appear close together. They are also just below a star cluster, the Beehive Cluster, Messier 44. You may be able to pick this out with binoculars. Take care to avoid the rising sun.

On 23rd August, same time and place, Venus and Jupiter are a little further apart and the crescent moon pops into the picture too. M44 is close to Jupiter.

An evening conjunction! From the middle of the month at around 9pm look SSW and find, quite low down, red/orange Mars and pale yellow Saturn. Try and follow them through the month – they will get lower. From the 25th they are very close together. On the 31st the crescent moon joins in and Saturn will

appear to be almost touching the top point of the crescent. Mars will be just below the moon and to the west of it.

Cassini, the NASA / ESA (European Space Agency) Saturn orbiter, has just completed 10 years at Saturn, 17 years in space. The technology it uses was designed about 30 years ago and it has never failed. The mission will be terminated towards the end of 2017 when the power source fails. Latest discovery: the ocean inside Titan (largest moon)(they are only close as seen from your viewpoint on the Earth) is likely to be as salty as the Dead Sea; the concentrated brine likely contains salts of potassium too.

Meteors – the Perseids are back. Look throughout the month but the peak is on the 13th at 1am. This year a bright moon will spoil the show but bright meteors should still be visible. I have just looked up last year's 'Heacham at Night' and see that I saw 38 Perseids then, but it was dark and clear. I have seen well over a 100 in a good year so have a go.





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There are also at least 5 other, smaller, meteor showers this month right from the first through to September. The moon sets before the Alpha Capricornids peak on the 1st /2nd and the Kappa Cygnids should give a show on the 18th.

A comet – C/2014 E2 Jacques - likely visible through binoculars or a small telescope all month except when the moon is bright. It is circumpolar which means it is always above the horizon and will get higher in the sky as the month progresses in a vertical line rising straight up from the NE. At the beginning of the month it is just to the west of the bright star Capella. It then climbs and is just below the first star of the W constellation

Cassiopeia on the 21th. Follow it straight up on subsequent nights.

Those of you with good binoculars or a small telescope can look for Uranus which is a good object at the end of the month. South about 40 degrees up and blue/green. Early hours for the best view. Stellarium will help you locate it.

A further reminder: Professor Gerry Gilmore from the Institute of Astronomy, Cambridge, talks about the GAIA space mission on Friday 12th September at 7.30pm. It is at King's Lynn Academy so parking will be free. Tickets are £5 and have been available from the end of June – contact me or turn up on the night.

I hope you see some meteors.

The Fox Brewery holds many events throughout the year and on Friday the 4th July (very fitting with it being American Independence Day) they had something special. Two groups over from California USA. It's not the first tour of England

but their first visit to Heacham. When asked on their thoughts of what they had seen and done so far they said they are filled with only good thoughts.

The first group was an Irish American trio Marty O'Reilly and The Old Soul Orchestra. They rocked the house with their music and singing. Guitar, violin, base and a very large cello which sent the beat throughout the pub.

It was a packed house and the weather was great too which was just as well because many were outside, otherwise it would have been shoulder to shoulder had it been raining.

Come eleven o'clock they had to stop playing to the disappointment of the crowd, there were chants of more, more, I believe it was for the music.

They left the next day to travel to Suffolk where they were playing at a festival and then onto Nottingham to continue with their tour

If you see that they are playing, it is well worth the visit.

The Kitchen Gardener

August – late summer. Strawberries, another use for all those courgettes, and when the going got tough the Women's Land Army and the Women's Timber Corps got going.

The strawberry crop is finished and the scent combinations from the kitchen compost bucket no longer offer up a garlic, strawberry and banana skin mixture. Exotic and not unpleasing in a strange way.

Strawberries will grow in the same bed for three years, four at a pinch but then cropping, fruit size and plant health diminish so they are best dug up and a new bed planted on fresh ground. The advice is that ground that has grown potatoes in the last few years is best avoided to prevent infection from Verticillium wilt.

I prefer a summer crop so won't bother with the alpines (birds, dawn raids, none for me) nor the perpetuals as they fruit summer and autumn, by which time I like to eat more seasonal fruit.

My strawberry bed is due for a replant now. The Cambridge Favourite and the Cambridge Late Pine have given a good first and second year crop but the Late Pine gave a light crop of very small fruit this year. Had they not I would have chanced a fourth year.

The new bed has been dug over with plenty of compost incorporated. My soil is very chalky so I'll rake in a generous dressing of Growmore just before planting. If I had enough room and a mix of plants I'm keen on, I'd peg runners and plant a new row each year — effectively moving the bed forward a row per year. The plants I used last time were frozen stock, maybe coincidence but I've never known strawberries put out such huge amounts of runners. I was removing them once a week even through the winter months.

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The hunt is on for new plants. Cambridge Favourite taste like the strawberries of my childhood but I read that Hapil are better on light soil in dry conditions. Royal Sovereign are gorgeous and the only strawberry I've grown for one year only. Out of twelve plants I got two pounds of fruit. The plants fell prey to every disease and mould that the wise heads warned about. My impetuous optimism dashed.

I'll aim to get the new plants in during early to mid autumn to get a crop next year, and I'll put them in eighteen inches apart, rows two and a half feet apart with the base of the crown at soil level. They will be given a good drink at least once a week while they establish.

The courgettes have been producing very well and with such plenty, time to pull out a recipe that makes a nice lunch or light supper.

Blanch for two minutes or lightly fry 2lb small firm sliced courgettes then drain and cool. Beat together 4 eggs and ¾ pint of milk, season and stir in 5oz grated or crumbled cheese of your choice. A strong cheddar would be good. Butter a 2 pint gratin dish and layer the courgettes with lightly cooked streaky bacon or leftover ham, cold sliced sausage or some such. Pour over the egg mixture and sprinkle the top with 2oz grated cheese. Bake in an oven pre-heated to 180C Gas4 for 40–45 mins until set and browned on top.

A generous salad dressed with a shallot vinaigrette together with crusty bread or a potato salad are nice additions to the table.

I suppose this is a quiche without the pastry which is probably for the best as even small firm courgettes give out a bit of liquid as they cook.

I've been learning about the Women's Land Army (WLA) and the Women's Timber Corps (WTC) and was surprised to read the WLA started way back during WW1 with 23,000 enrolments in 1918. In March 1940 it was estimated that there was a deficit of 130,000 regular and seasonal workers on the land due to men going off to war. Step up thousands of women whose reasons for joining the WLA and the WTC were as varied as the women themselves.

Reading their first hand accounts of work and working conditions, lack of rations, pain and laughter. leaves me proud of the spine and resourcefulness of our female forbears.

A lot of them were town girls, sometimes living in hostels sometimes billeted on the farm or with the older farm workers, often having to prove themselves to counter the farmers and the old farm hands resistance to females doing the work of young men. Many had worked only in shops or offices prior to joining; some hadn't worked before at all.



They laboured hard from pre-dawn (when milking) to dusk and late into the evening in double summertime, with little or no mechanisation. Many of them remember constant hunger, hedging, ditching, ploughing with horses, hand milking herds of cows, muck spreading with horse and cart – muck forked onto the cart from the heap and forked off again over the fields. Harvesting with horse and wagon, pitchforks and old fashioned reapers – not a combine in sight. Depending on the location of postings, there was a risk of bombs or sneak raiders peppering outlying villages with bullets and also the risk of jettisoned bombs from enemy bombers as they limped home.

One woman said her favourite job was setting out tomato plants in the warm greenhouse, between which she buried old carrots. Each morning she had to pull up the carrots and cut out the wireworm and then re-bury the carrots. This was to keep the wireworm off the tomatoes. Another woman (very fresh from minimal training) didn't fare so well with the tomatoes – she was told to de-bud the side shoots and mistakenly stripped off all the leaves!

This month I shall sow the last of the outdoor lettuce, spring cabbages and some parsley for picking over the winter. I shall be squashing the eggs of the cabbage butterflies on the backs of the brassica leaves. The gauge of my nets keeps some of the butterflies off, but not all. Some is better than none though. While they are nice and hot and busy I'll turn the compost heaps to let in some more air and hopefully produce the finished compost sooner.

All a walk in the park compared to the work of the WLA and the WTC. My admiration for them is boundless.

who met and spoke to the Judges about your support of Heacham In Bloom on the judging tour. Although Judging is over, the Team will still be out watering, deadheading and weeding.



Participation in Hunstanton in Bloom became a key part of Kings Lynn and West Norfolk Borough Council's (KL&WN Borough Council) regeneration plans for Hunstanton and the surrounding area around 2006. Since Hunstanton got involved nearby villages were inspired to take part. For the first time in the history of our local websites, we have gone on the trail of the In Bloom judging to find out up close and personal what its really all about.

Along the way we learned that Ringstead and Old Hunstanton withdrew from the competition over the years because it was felt winning awards was unnecessary. Despite this, both villages continue to be beautifully maintained and it is enjoyable to walk or drive around them both. Heacham and Hunstanton have both stayed the course and have gone from strength to strength. Both Heacham and Hunstanton have consistently improved on previous years and achieved awards and recognition for their contributions to Anglia in Bloom. So why put in all that hard work and how do these two different holiday locations achieve their fantastic results?

Lucy Pickup (on work experience with Hunstanton On Line from Smithdon High School) and I endeavoured to find out by following Anglia in Bloom judges on judging day (Brian Gardner and Bob Ollier) and talked to some of those that help make it all happen. Escorting the judges in Hunstanton were Cllr Elizabeth Watson, Chris Durham (Operations Manager Commercial Services at KL&WN Borough Council) and Pat Richardson (Vice Chair of Hunstanton In Bloom and a Henry Le Strange Community Orchard Warden).

Together we learned that KL&WN Borough Council has been the primary sponsor of Hunstanton in Bloom from the start and Hunstanton Town Council as well as local businesses regularly support their work. In addition, there are many people from throughout the town who volunteer to help including Brownies, Scouts, Councillors and local retired residents. As a result of all this support, very little fundraising is needed to support their planting/gardening projects. In fact Blossom Day (based around the Le Strange Community Orchard) is the only fundraising the Hunstanton in Bloom team actually do.

We met Adrian Withington, Orchard Warden, along with Kate Dunbar, one of the primary instigators of the Orchard, now in its third year, after the original idea was put forward by Elaine Bird of Hunstanton Town & Around. The Community Orchard - now boasting some 101 trees - has proved to be a highly successful community project and it is hoped that it will provide a harvest of all kinds of fruits (edible fruits expected in 2014) as well as become an important home for a variety of wildlife. The judges were guided around the Orchard by Adrian and Kate who explained that the trees within the Community Orchard had been chosen, sponsored and planted by local businesses, community groups, individuals and families. Indeed, Redgate Junior School and Hunstanton Infant School children had all worked hard planting over 25,000 native wildflowers including Primroses and Oxeve Daisies which will eventually spread throughout the Orchard.

Underlining the importance Hunstanton places on its role in Anglia in Bloom, live entertainment was arranged specifically for judging day and the judges dropped by to see the trumpeter at recently redeveloped Spinney plaza outside Legge's Cafe. This new open space can be hired at no cost for up and coming bands/musicians and it is hoped such entertainemnt will become a regular feature on our local landscape. Lucy and I certainly found it most enjoyable and relaxing listening to the sound of the trumpet whilst dining al fresco and can see it attracting many visitors for years to come.

Our two judges had a very busy day indeed, heading to Heacham immediately after lunch. On talking with the Heacham In Bloom team, Lucy and I learned that KL&WN Borough Council wanted the villages to get involved with In Bloom and approached Heacham Parish Council with some initial support to get them started in 2009. Susan Richardson, a Heacham resident felt strongly that it would be good for the village and was the first Chair of the Heacham in Bloom Committee, stepping down in 2013 with the post currently vacant. It was clear that the lack of a designated Chair was not an issue though as there is a very good team in place all working together to keep things moving forward. Sadly, after the first year of Heacham In Bloom, economic cutbacks ensured that Heacham was on its own and had to rely solely on fundraising campaigns and the generosity of donations from the public and sponsors. In addition, 100% of the work on the floral displays is carried out by volunteers with no manpower support from KL&WN Borough Council.

Heacham traditionally follows a theme for the whole village, rather than individual themed beds as seen in Hunstanton. This year's theme was focussed around the popular Remembrance Day poppy. Along the In Bloom trail in Heacham it was a sea of bright red flowers throughout. They say that necessity is the mother of invention and necessity has made the Heacham team very resourceful in recycling old blooms and this year they also recycled artificial poppies from last year's Remembrance Day wreaths to great effect.

Heacham Junior School was an unexpected surprise and reiterated the fact that all areas of a community can really get stuck in with a project like In Bloom. The school has created an eco-friendly learning environment as part of Heacham In Bloom. Over some two or three years outdoor project has developed to include:

- * A greenhouse made out of plastic lemonade bottles this you have to see to appreciate!
- * Lots of bird feeders to encourage bird life.
- * A hide to observe the bird life from.
- * A herb garden.
- * A vegetable garden.
- * Outdoor classroom resembles an exposed summer house opened 2 years ago.
- * Wild garden left that way to encourage bug life do regular bug hunts.
- * Wild wood.

Within the wild wood you can see a number of impressive trees which have hearts attached to them clearly saying the tree has been adopted by a child or two. The children are encouraged to get really proactive with their outdoor project and get close to nature, resulting in an outstanding and hands on learning project.

During the Heacham judging a cup presentation was made to Geraldine Roseblade at Palm Beach Holiday Park on North Beach with Diane Jarrod and Nigel Buckley representing Seashore Holiday Park. Both caravan parks were awarded certificates for Best Blooming Caravan Park. Looking around we could see their awards were highly justified.

Another key point of interest in Heacham was the Alms Houses. Trustee, Stephanie Smeaton told us that the villages collected pennies circa 1895/6 and the Rolfe family donated the land to enable development of the Alms Houses to provide low cost homes for the lady spinsters of the village. Over the years the houses had fallen into disrepair but in 2009 a project was set up to renovate the houses and naturally there are no funds to maintain the gardens so they have become part of Heacham In Bloom

Our journey alongside the Anglia In Bloom judges was a very interesting one indeed and it was very clear that the hard work put in by the town of Hunstanton and the village of Heacham has resulted in beautifully enhanced environments adding further polish to what we already know is an Area of Outstanding Beauty here in West Norfolk.

So its best of luck to Hunstanton for the Britain in Bloom judging on 4 August 2014 and fingers crossed we get more great awards to the accolades already reaped by Heacham and Hunstanton.

P46: Filing date for form P46(Car) for quarter ended 5 July 2014.

7 August - VAT: due date for VAT return and payment for 30 June 2014 quarter (electronic payment).

14 August - EC sales: monthly EC sales list if paper returns used.

19 August - Employers: 2013/14 Class 1A NIC not paid by these dates (i.e. 30 days late) will attract a 5% penalty: 19 August for payments by cheque (and 22 August for electronic payments).



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



HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

Meetings for July in Brief

Cheney Hill: The Council noted that the Clerk had met with the PCSO to discuss residents' concerns about speeding and parking on Cheney Hill at School times. Norfolk Police would monitor the standard of parking in the new term. The School, Police and Parish Council would discuss what improvements to the School entrances might be made in the future.

Festival of poppies: The Chairman congratulated St Mary's Church on the WW1 exhibition which had been both moving and informative.

Former Dairy Site: The Council's negotiations to purchase the site were continuing, now that the likely cost of clearing the site was known. The Council planned to set up a series of drop in sessions to go over ideas for the site, subject to the satisfactory conclusion of negotiations.

Land off School Road: The Council noted that an appeal had been lodged, but not yet validated. The Council agreed to work on a response to the appeal.

East Coast Wash Management: The Council noted that there would be two meetings to discuss how the flood defences would be funded and what type of defences would be required. Drop-in sessions for residents were being organised by the Environment Agency in Hunstanton, Heacham and Snettisham to mark the start of the public consultation.

Footway Lighting: The Council approved The Lighting and Watching Committee's proposal to investigate the benefits of using LEDs for footway lighting in the village in the future.

Hot Shots Day

Heacham Wildfowlers' Assoc. will be hosting their Hot Shots day on Saturday 9th August at the Chalk Pit. Children from the ages of 8 to 18 can try their hand at Clay Pigeon shooting, under the supervision of BASC instructors. Places must be booked in advance via the Parish Council Office or at the Wildfowlers' Stall at the Fete on 3rd August. Cost of a session is £2.00.

Letter from Parish Council Chairman

Heacham is one again the focus for Developers, this time from two sides. The expected appeal has been lodged for the development off School Road. As I write, the full details of the appeal are not yet available but when they are we will have to look carefully at the Developers' grounds for appeal and make our case accordingly. Unlike the Planning Committee, who refused the application, the Planning Inspector hearing the appeal will not be familiar with Heacham. This will be the last chance that residents have to make their views known, so please make the most of the opportunity and speak up once again.


A planning application has also been submitted by Hopkins Homes to build 166 homes in Hunstanton. Although this development is on land in Hunstanton, the access to the new development would be via Hunstanton Road. The Parish Council do not feel the impact on Heacham and in particular Hunstanton Road has been properly recognised by the Developers. It looks increasingly like Hunstanton would get the houses it needs, not to mention Council Tax revenue, but Heacham would get all the traffic.
