Lousy Bush Wood

I can answer Hugh Williams' query about Lousy Bush Wood, as this was researched some years ago by the late Dr. John Wells.

Lousy is a corruption of Lowry (or Lowrie), which is an old name for Laurel, so a lousy bush is a laurel bush. Lousy Bush Wood still contains a large population of the Spurge Laurel (Daphne laureola) which gives it its name.

Dr. Wells found that other places elsewhere in the country with Lousy or Lowry in the name were also associated with Spurge Laurel.

Lousy Bush

In your August edition, Hugh Williams asked "What is a Lousy Bush?"

Ninety nine point nine percent of the answers on Google suggested George W! However, I remember going along Ringstead Road on nature walks with Miss Hume, our class teacher, when I was in Heacham School in the early 1950s. She told us that a Lousy Bush was a tree beneath which agricultural workers would sit to delouse themselves or pick off ticks before returning to the village. She pointed out a tree, its trunk protected by steel bands, which used to stand on the left as you headed out of Heacham towards Ringstead. I'm sure she told us that this was Heacham's "Lousy Bush".

Whether any of this is correct or not I don't know, but it certainly made sense to my impressionable mind. I think it's a great tribute to Miss Hume that I still recall much of what she taught us after more than 60 years and, right or wrong, hers is certainly a more colourful and interesting explanation than anything I've found on the internet. It also makes sense in the context of a small country village.

There is still time to have your say about the future management of the coastline between Hunstanton Cliffs and Wolferton Creek.

The Wash East Coastal Management Strategy identifies a range of options from 'do nothing' to improving the standard of protection to a one in 75 year chance of flooding in any one year throughout the frontage. The public consultation on the recommendations is open until 8th September 2014 so you still have a few days to submit your views.

Miss Torrey drove around in an old estate car and lent out her field for dog shows and girls were allowed to look after her horses. Jenny's cafe had pinball machines and the church still had pews and Rev'd Pott. Best of all there were some village characters, long since gone, who kept the village amused with their antics. All history now, and maybe for some, the best days.

For me, the constant thread in this patchwork of village history, is The Lord. In all our histories, our comings and goings, He is present, even if we choose to ignore Him. Let's take time today to think of our own stories and maybe say a thank you prayer for the good days, and for the difficult days when we were sustained by a knowing, loving Lord. Let's thank The Lord that for us the boundary lines have fallen in pleasant places. And for the record, we are all notable alumni in the college of The Lord.



King's Lynn Festival Chorus Heacham Workshop

Come and sing Faure's Requiem at St Mary's Church, Heacham, on Saturday October 18th 2014 under the directorship of one of the UK's most gifted and inspirational young conductors and join with King's Lynn Festival Chorus in the celebrations for the 100 year anniversary of the church's magnificent organ.

Tom Appleton is the Music Director of King's Lynn Festival Chorus and will make you sing and understand this glorious work by Faure as you have never experienced it before. "A concert in a day" is the challenge and you will be astonished at the high level of performance Tom is able to achieve in just a few hours of rehearsal.

Tom sings professionally with the world famous Monteverdi Choir and is rapidly making a name for himself, not only as a conductor, but also as a soloist with a memorable performance at a recent Proms concert. Last year he was also appointed Music Outreach Director at Gresham's School, Holt.

The day starts in the church at 10am with coffee and registration followed by a morning rehearsal, lunch, afternoon rehearsal and buffet supper in the church hall. Breaks will be at Tom's discretion so times might be variable throughout the day but rehearsals will almost certainly finish by 5pm. Those wishing to go home, not have supper and be back for the concert performance at 7.30pm, will have ample time to do so.

The cost of the day is £18 per head for all meals and refreshments as well as the workshop. The cost is the same regardless of whether you take up the offer for supper or not.

Spaces will be limited so it is a case of first come first served with the proviso that Tom has final decision on the make up of the choir. We don't want 60 altos and only 2 tenors obviously!

St Mary's Pocahontas link

A special service will be taking place on Sunday 7th September at 2.00pm to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the wedding of John Rolfe and Princess Pocahontas in 1614.

The service also marks the visit of the National Society of Colonial Dames XVII Century from the USA who have a special interest in this link. The Dolly Phenomenon

The music world is used to sensations – but this one was little short of staggering. And, on the face of it, so unlikely. Listen – there's going down well, and there's getting a good reception ... but this was verging on the ridiculous.

I'm talking about Dolly Parton at Glastonbury Festival – or, as I think we have to call it, The Dolly Phenomenon.

Glastonbury is many things to many people these days. But you still wouldn't expect a veteran country and western singer, who hasn't had a chart hit here for some time, and is old enough to be many fellow performers' grandmother, to be such an incredible success. Dolly's impact was amazing.

Let's put this into context. It seemed that just about everybody at Glastonbury wanted to see Dolly – artists and audience alike. At a festival renowned for the size of its crowds, Dolly's was simply unbelievable. And never let it be said of Dolly that size didn't matter!

She drew an even bigger crowd than "the greatest rock and roll band in the world," The Rolling Stones, last year. Yes! More people wanted to see Dolly than the Stones!

This year's big deal was Metallica, one of the fastest and loudest metal bands on the planet, and certainly Glastonbury's heaviest-ever headliners. But when asked who he most wanted to catch at the festival, Metallica's drummer Lars Ulrich, with positively boyish enthusiasm, said: "I want to see Dolly!"

He pounds the skins for Metallica, the titans of thrash for heaven's sake – and more than anyone he wants to see Dolly Parton! How does that work?!

But he wasn't alone, was he? Most of the acts interviewed said the same thing, and you have to feel sorry for the poor saps who had to perform at the same time as Dolly, because by all accounts their audiences were pretty threadbare.

It was estimated that over 100,000 people saw Dolly at Glastonbury. But festival co-organiser Emily Eavis went one better on the official website, saying: "Dolly's was the biggest crowd I've ever seen here."

I'm sorry? This is the daughter of festival founder Michael Eavis, she grew up with Glastonbury ... and she's NEVER seen a bigger crowd there than the one for Dolly Parton!

How did that happen? Not exactly rock and roll, is it? Or even especially trendy? So what did all these people know that non-Dolly fans didn't?


Dolly was in the late-afternoon "legends" slot – not even close to a main evening headlining billing, not that that mattered. But I guess there are legends ... and then there are legends! And let's face it, Dolly has always been larger than life.

Watching her set, it didn't take you long to realise that here was a true star, a consummate performer, who could work a crowd quite brilliantly – no matter HOW big it was.

She has that rare gift, that transcends just being a singer – the ability to communicate the very warmth of her personality. You can feel it, it's emotional. It's a lovely thing.

And with Dolly, what you see is what you get. OK, it might not be what she was born with – but she makes no bones about that, either. There's no artifice with Dolly – and it's so refreshing.

She's had a career lasting well over half a century, achieved over 100 million sales (that puts her on a par with Paul McCartney and Bob Dylan), and written over 3,000 songs (Three thousand! How about that?). But underneath it all, as she told the



Glastonbury crowd, she's just a farmer's daughter from rural Tennessee, "so I know what mud is!"

She cheerfully told the festival-goers that when she was young she modelled her look on the local woman of ill-repute – but she happened to be the prettiest, so what did it matter?!

Anecdotes like this were lapped up by a rapturous crowd – liberally sprinkled with lads paying their own "tribute" in blonde wigs and with balloons stuffed up their shirts.

Dolly talks quite a lot between songs – probably more than anyone I've seen, save for the positively story-telling Bruce Springsteen – but how great is that, really.

It comes straight from the heart, and soon she has the crowd eating out of her hand (not the place one banner-waver in the crowd urged Dolly to clasp him to!). And what a nice change from some po-faced performers who take themselves altogether too seriously these days.

We learned that Dolly was one of 12 children, and that her song Coat Of Many Colours was written about the prejudice she received because of her poor upbringing. And – perhaps a surprise to many, as it certainly was to me – that she wrote I Will Always Love You not as a token of undying love for her man, as Whitney Houston's version leads you to imagine, but as a platonic pledge to her former singing partner, Porter Wagoner, when she quit to go solo.

And what about her songs. You forget how many all-out classics she's written. But listening to a set full of them, you realise she has that rare gift of doing the simple things well – writing catchy melodies, and lyrics that strike a chord with everyone.

Probably the best example is her evergreen, Jolene – an absolutely heart-wrenching song, a plea from one girl to her much prettier rival, not to take her man "just because you can." This is such a powerful song that even such a cool and trendy

modern-day icon as Jack White has covered it with The White Stripes, in a particularly torrid blues rock version.

But yes, Jolene was a real person, and it all happened to Dolly and her husband – but she's still married to him, "and I got a great song out of it, so thank you, Jolene!"

She cuts a striking figure – petite, with an improbably thin waist below that famous impossibly stacked upper half. It's just as well she freely confesses her love of plastic surgery. She once quipped: "It takes a lot of money to look this cheap!," and told Oprah Winfrey: "If I have one more facelift, I'll have a beard!"

But unlike some of her veteran contemporaries, who can now only boast rather reedy imitations of past glories, Dolly still has a beautiful and melodic voice. Not bad for a 68-year-old.

Make way, you young whippersnappers – Glastonbury has a new queen of hearts.

The Kitchen Gardener



September – early Autumn. A pyjama-less pea season, tree fruit harvest time begins and squirrelling tendencies emerge.

Glory be – found room in the fruit cage for this year's crop of mange tout peas, and what a difference it made. Pigeons will sell their souls and their grannies for a feed of tender young pea shoots. The nets and supports go up before the module grown plants are put out. As they mature I have to put up taller extra canes set at angles with plastic milk bottles atop followed by a second net – a garden version of a bristling twelve mile exclusion zone. If I don't, the birds land on net one and peck through killing the growing points of the young peas, leaving their calling card behind to add insult to injury.

As I often mis-time the second netting and the clever birds sneak up just after dawn – serious nuisance they may be but they're not stupid – I'm frequently to be seen dashing up the garden in pyjamas to shoo them off.

New site in the fruit cage has put a stop to all that and picking un-netted peas felt like the height of luxury. A pea patch will now join the sweetcorn in rotation in a safe haven. Sweetcorn, squirrels, same problem. Cobs ready, mouth watering and a pan of hot water on the hob. Up the garden to pick for cooking only to find ears stripped bare and little scraps of spat out corn on the soil below, the corn and myself looking rather sad and desolate.

I've tried lots of peas over the years but always come back to mange tout Oregon Sugar Pod. They are sown in succession in modules. I plant them out four inches apart – the extra spacing

can extend the crop over a longer period as there's less competition for nutrients and water.

They are sweet, delicious and versatile. They can be eaten raw or cooked, hot or cold at all stages of maturity. I put a couple of tablespoons of water into the base of a wide pan, add the peas with a sprig of mint and put onto the heat to cook quickly with the lid on. When the water has evaporated and you can hear they are just about to catch on the base of the pan, whip them off the heat and leave the lid on for about half a minute. Remove lid and they're ready to eat. This method brings out all the sweetness and flavour – sometimes I let them cook on a few seconds longer and just start to caramelise on the base of the pan, then they are really sweet.

I'm hopeless at growing main crop peas. Worm, miss the vital picking moment when they are at their prime, hot couple of days and the pods shrivel and the peas go mealy. But even the old mealy peas have their uses straight off the vine or dried.

Pease Pudding is one of our oldest English dishes.

Soaked overnight (if dried) the peas are put with a pinch or two of sugar and mint into a greased pudding cloth, tied up and suspended beside a simmering bacon joint. After a couple of hours both are removed from the pan and the pudding - which has soaked up all the flavours from the slow cooked bacon joint-is placed on a serving dish and pulled apart with two forks. The crumbly lumps are served hot with a dusting of white pepper and a ladleful of the hot bacon broth alongside the bacon.

I like this recipe for its practicality, the frugality of using up the mealy peas and one pot cooking and, with the peas providing the starch, saving on potatoes. I can see that when lots of smallholders kept pigs, this whole meal would have come from their own patch. I'd have a poke about in the windfalls box and serve an apple sauce too - and a really hot English mustard. I'm sure a lot of cooks did that and probably still do.

I've often wondered if Carlins were dried peas, but it turns out that they are small dried brown pulses that look a bit like Chick Peas. There's a long northern tradition of serving them on Carlin Sunday - the fifth Sunday in Lent – soaked overnight then boiled for twenty minutes or so, they are drained and fried for two to three minutes in a knob of butter and served hot sprinkled with brown sugar and rum.

This month I'll be sowing late Autumn and Winter salading for the polytunnel to go in as soon as the tomatoes are taken out — mizuna, tatsoi, pak choi, corn salad, overwinter lettuce and as an experiment some non hearting frisee lettuce to use as a cut and come again. Outside and towards the end of the month I'll be planting the overwinter onions and the very best cloves of garlic saved from this year's crop.

The first of the maincrop apples – as opposed to the early apples eaten straight off the tree which will not store for more than a couple of weeks – will be ready to pick sometime this month. It's often a case of picking a few from each tree, rarely is the entire harvest from one tree ready at the same time. First signs will be a few windfalls and a slight change in fruit colour which I found hard to detect when I first started to grow fruit – but as with all things you get your eye adjusted with experience, and come to know each tree's little habits, likes and dislikes and growing conditions.

It is remarkable how the micro climate and growing conditions can vary in a garden – even by a few feet. After what I think is a generous rainfall I can take a trowel and delve under one tree and the soil a couple of inches below will be dry and the tree a few feet away can be nicely hydrated.

I've planted a quince in a spot that drains too quickly and am paying the price with a petulant and disease prone tree yet the damson a few feet away is doing nicely. You live and learn, one hopes....

An apple is only ready for picking when lifted gently in the palm of the hand and given a slight twist and it comes away easily. It should then be placed very carefully into the bucket making every effort not to bruise it. Bruised and damaged apples should not be put into the winter store but in a separate box to be used first. Marred fruit turns quickly and will send off those around it.

Apples will store for a period of weeks or months depending on the apple. I use ventilated trays that stack with a gap between. I don't wrap the apples, they are gently placed in the trays - they are not crammed in but they often just touch each other. I check the fruit store once a week and remove any that show even a sign of turning – again a very slight change of colour, scent, or brown spots are hints.

The long keeping cookers and eaters will store until April, others I'll start eating around the end of September, beginning of October – when they tell me they are ripe and ready.

When taking fruit from the store I use the largest apples first, the more compact fruit will last longer. This is a trick I learned from RHS Wisley when attending a fruit lecture – they sell off the largest apples first, and keep the smaller apples for sale later in the year, the cells are smaller within the structure of the more compact fruit and so will take longer to age and decay.

By the way, Carlin Sunday is often followed by Carlin Monday. Apparently it's the Jerusalem Artichoke effect. Just so you know.....

Heacham at Night

(Pictures from European Space Agency via New scientist)

Met. Office autumn begins on September 1st. The equinox on 23rd September is the start of astronomical autumn. The equinox is when day and night are each about 12 hours long. The full Moon of 9th September is the Harvest Moon, as it is the one closest to the equinox.

Looking back at last month; did you see some Perseid meteors? I did just by standing in the back garden at Heacham and looking up. Here is the record:

Monday 11/12th

Late until early morning 3 meteors at Heacham including one air burst in the direction of Hunstanton.

Tuesday 12th

10pmish at North Norfolk Astronomy Society's barbecue at Wiveton. 10 meteors including 4 very bright — one like a fireworks rocket and 2 that passed through the Plough. Also saw several satellites and a very bright International Space Station. Supermoon (a little past best) held in check by cloud, clear otherwise. Saturn and Mars low down, just discerned rings through small scope. 2 meteors seen back at Heacham despite thin overcast cloud — meteor trails lit up back of clouds

Wednesday 13th

11.30pm+ 4 meteors, 3 faint, 1 bright.

I have seen more but this show included the brightest meteors I have ever seen. Well worth it. There are other regular showers to come so if you missed the Perseids look out for them.

What to look for this month: If Panstarrs (see below) is a bit too early in the morning and hard to spot, have breakfast and start looking east about 6.30am from about the 20th. You will see a thin crescent Moon. Close, but to the left and above it, will be



-000-

Jupiter – you are looking right across the solar system, beyond the sun, to see it. Due east and close to the horizon will be bright Venus. This is also on the other side of the sun and will show as an almost full disc through steady binoculars – don't catch the sun as it rises. Over the next three days the Moon moves lower in the sky and closer to the east. On the 23rd the Moon and Venus are closest together and the Moon shows the barest sliver of itself.

Now for something in the evening from the 25th: between 7 and 8pm look south-west. On the 25th, close to the horizon, you should see two red dots. The slightly brighter, higher, one is Mars whilst the lower is the red giant star Antares – its name means 'rival of Mars'. By the 27th the crescent moon has joined in and to the left of that, at about the same elevation as Mars is the dim, yellowish, speck which is Saturn. A telescope will still reveal the rings. Saturn is to the right of the moon on the 28th. On the 29th, the Moon, Mars and Arcturus form an almost vertical line in the SW.

Mercury is an early evening object at the beginning of the month. Start looking almost due west from about 7pm. It is low down and the sun will still be peeping over the horizon so take care. You are looking for a bright spark almost lost in the sunset. Heacham beaches have always proved a good place to be for Mercury spotting

If you want to have a stab of spotting Uranus, about 1,800,000,000 miles away, about 1am on the 11th is a good time to try. It is then very close to the Moon. Look, with steady binoculars, just below the southern edge and a little to the left. A blue green dot will be Uranus. It will be visible most of the month. Stellarium, in the library, will help you find where to look

Star asterisms – face south and tilt your head back, the Great Square of Pegasus should stand out- 4 stars of similar brightness separated by a fist or two at arm's length - while to the SW the Summer triangle is still evident – Altair, Vega and Deneb.

Comets are in the news again. The Rosetta craft is going around (well not quite round, see below) comet 67P/ Churyumov-



Gerasimenko. The names are of Russians, the second being woman а which makes change. Τ heir observatory was in the n independent country Kazakhstan. This comet is a short period one going around the sun in about 6 and a half years and will be closest to the sun in about a vear's time.

The Rosetta craft was due to be launched earlier and rendezvous with a different comet but this could not happen due to a problem

with the Ariane 5 rocket launcher. Anyway, it was launched in 2004 and has spent 10 years getting to its destination. Famously, it was 'asleep' for three years to conserve energy systems – it gets energy from solar panels – and waking it up became a news story.

In case the image above is not clear, Rosetta is going around the comet in a triangular pattern at the time of writing, mapping the surface. Early this month it drops closer into a circular orbit and then an elliptical orbit. It will drop a lander, Philae, in early November. This is about as big as a washing machine and will anchor itself down. The lander's name is that of an obelisk used in conjunction with the Rosetta stone to decipher Egyptian hieroglyphics – the spacecraft will answer questions about comets.



67P/C-G turned out to have an unusual shape likened to a rubber duck. Speculation is that two bodies collided in the distant past. This is the nucleus of the comet. It will not start

to gas out and produce a tail until it is closer to the sun.

Another comet making astronomical news, if not the Lynn News, is C/2012 K1 PANSTARRS. This is not the one possibly seen in the evening last year but another discovered by PANSTARRS observatory. Binoculars should see it, low in the east, from the middle of the month. A predawn object, you have to start looking from about 5am. On the 20th there is a crescent Moon; Jupiter is slightly above it and due east. The comet will be about as twice as far below and to the south of the Moon as the distance Jupiter is away from it. Otherwise, from the beginning of the month look east and low down, the comet gets progressively lower and moves towards the south as the month progresses. Unlike the short period comet Rosetta has chased, Panstarrs is a long period (time as yet unspecified) comet that originated in the far distant Oort cloud which is well beyond the planets.

A reminder - Professor Gerry Gilmore from the Institute of Astronomy, Cambridge, talks about the GAIA space mission on Friday 12th September at 7.30pm. It is at King's Lynn Academy so parking will be free. Tickets are now available at £5 – contact me or turn up on the night. And a message to Carol Woodhouse: I will help you sort the telescope but the 'phone number given does not work. I hope there are some clear nights.





PART IV: BUILDING PLOTS

With the current increase in property values and a return of lenders with an appetite to assist with property matters, subject to status, people are exploring how to make the most of their assets and a popular plan is to explore selling off excess land as a building plot. If you are fortunate enough to have "spare" garden land and live in an area which will allow development then an opportune course of action might be to obtain planning permission for part of the plot. This then gives rise to the question of whether you are thinking of building on the land yourself and selling on; moving into the new property personally; or selling the plot, with the benefit of planning permission, to a third party, who then takes on the development project but pays you a healthy premium for the bare land.

If such an exercise is planned thoroughly and managed well, then it can be the key to a useful cash bounty. However, despite the plethora of TV programmes suggesting that land development is easy, a badly carried out project can result in heartache, financial hardship and an unexpected tax bill. Good and careful planning is, as ever, a prerequisite to success and the first port of call after the architect or planning consultant should be your Accountant/Tax Adviser as the tax treatment of the development is fundamental to a satisfactory outcome. Errors and oversight here, can give rise to unwanted tax bills and the figures can be high.

So, what are the tax considerations to take advice on? The first question is the treatment of the garden plot itself. Garden land can be worth as little as £5,000 per acre with no planning permission, however, an acre of development land can be worth a considerable sum and this uplift in value can create a large tax bill. A common misconception is that the sale of a garden plot is always free from Capital Gains Tax (CGT). This is not the case and there are a number of "elephant traps" for the unwary. If planned carefully then the land may be deemed part of your "Principal Private Residence" (PPR) and hence be covered by the exemption that prevents CGT being charged when you dispose of your PPR, or part of it. However, the land must be being enjoyed as part of the property (it needs to be garden rather than waste land or a field or paddock) and, in most cases, the entire plot (before being split) must be under half a hectare in area (around one and a quarter acres). Furthermore the usage and enjoyment needs to be continuing as at the date of sale. Hence, for example, if you were in the process of selling the house and the garden plot at the same time, perhaps to separate purchasers, but, not realising otherwise, due to delays with contracts, sold off the house before the plot then you are at risk of having automatically cancelled out the CGT exemption; because, despite the plot having been part of the garden for years, at the point of sale it was simply a piece of ground and cannot be connected with the house as this is already sold! Structured another way, ensuring the garden is sold off first, can achieve the same return but with no unpleasant CGT bill at a maximum of 28%.

The potential CGT exemption is of utmost importance and, given the potential tax liability at stake, HM Revenue & Customs look at this very carefully indeed.

If you have progressed to this point and simply plan to sell off the bare land with the benefit of the planning then you may stop here. (Having said that, every set of circumstances is different and it would be far preferable to take advice ahead of entering into any transaction.)

If you are considering building the new house and become a "speculative" builder in your own right, then detailed tax planning is paramount. The temptation is that by doing this you can potentially benefit from the increase in the land value due to the planning permission (as you would do if you simply sold it bare) but then, in the hope that the profit in the building itself may be yours as well! Another possibility might be that you have a property built and then move into the new one and sell or let out your existing property? **There are endless possibilities. All of them have taxation consequences** (you may become a "trading" builder for example and need to register for self employment or operate through a limited company perhaps) and



can be dealt with to advantage but obtaining proper professional help is advisable all round. As an aside, there is always also the spectre of VAT to consider.

The moral of the tale is to take specialist taxation advice at an early stage. It will incur a fee but can save many thousands if it avoids a course of action that leaves you liable to a tax that you were not expecting.

HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

Parish Council Meetings in Brief

Heacham Carnival Parade: The Council was pleased to report that the parade had gone very well. The Council acknowledged the invaluable support of the volunteer marshals, Heacham Club Charity and the sponsors Jennings Shop and Norfolk Lavender.

Heacham Park Project: The Project Committee stated that it had issued over 2500 leaflets around the village asking residents to support the proposal to fund the purchase of the park via the village council tax. The Project Committee had also organised a public meeting to discuss the proposal which had been well attended. The Committee asked the Parish Council to underwrite a bid for the Heacham Park. It was acknowledged that the amount required, up to £500,000.00, would have to be borrowed, although it was the Committee's intention to continue to fundraise. Councillors asked for more information about the management of the park before they could make a decision. A separate fact finding meeting was arranged between the Council and the Park Committee. It was then agreed at that meeting, the Parish Council would ask for a meeting with the Youth and Community Trust to confirm the Trust's position.

Old Friends' Hall: The Management Committee was pleased to announce that the Jubilee Trust had agreed funding to ensure the refurbishment of the outdated toilets. Work to make the toilets fully accessible would start in September. New storage cupboards had also been installed in the main hall.

The Dairy Site: The Council noted that the vendors had agreed to the reduced offer proposed by the Council in July. The Council did agree the Heads of Terms, subject to finance. Several councillors asked for more details of the Council's planned and likely expenditure in the future.

Hopkins Homes: The Chairman confirmed that the Council had submitted an objection to the development proposed to the South of Hunstanton.

School Road Planning Appeal: The Council noted that the appeal had been submitted and validated, but as yet the deadline for submissions to the Planning Inspectorate had not been published. The Council would seek the advice of a planning consultant to assist in the compilation of its objection.

Photography Exhibition: The OFH Committee reminded Council of the planned photography exhibition on 13 September.

Church Green Seat: The new seat at the Church Green was now in place and the damaged concrete plinth replaced with setts. The Green is not public land and the Parish Council are grateful to the owners for their kind permission to allow a seat to remain on the site.

Litter Bins

It is not unusual to find the odd carrier bag of waste by the village litter bins in the summer. However, the Council has noted a large increase in the misuse of litter bins, with bags of garden and household waste being shoved into many of the bins all over the village. The Council reminds residents that the litter bins are for litter only. If households have more rubbish than will fit into their own bin, the Parish Council sells red tags that can be put around black bin bags. These bags can then be put out with the black bins and will be removed at the same time that the bins are emptied.

Thinking Fuel Campaign

Norfolk Rural Community Council is urging people to buy their oil early this year and avoid higher prices. As part of the buy early campaign, NRCC is offering free lifetime membership of its oil buying scheme "Thinking Fuel". Traditionally the summer months are a better time to buy oil than the winter when prices tend to rise and delivery can be more difficult around peak times. Norfolk RCC's buy-early campaign is aimed at encouraging people to check their tank now and see if they can accommodate an early order or even just a top-up. Thinking Fuel is an oil buying scheme; with over 2,500 members it saves people on average £120 a year through buying together. With the scheme everyone pays the price per litre, regardless of how much they order. The deadline for the free lifetime membership offer is the 19th September. ARTHUR SAMUEL GROOM

Grandfather was Private Arthur Samuel Groom and he served in WW1. He was born in Heacham about 1886 and was only a young lad when he joined up at the age of 14/15 to see action in the Boer War in 1902, he survived that war by being in charge of the Padre's horse



and by the other soldiers, perhaps thinking of their own sons back home, sharing their food with him. At the start of WW1, Private Groom was a professional soldier, trained to be a sniper, serving in the Royal Norfolks. My grandfather saw action in France and although wounded several times, he served throughout the War. I am proud to have the medals that he was awarded. He often told how he was one of the serving soldiers that laid the first wreath on the Heacham War Memorial. My

Grandfather was a typical country man and as a boy, he would take me off to shoot rabbits for tea and on a Sunday, we would comb the beaches for coal to put on the fire. How proud I was walking home with him. My grandfather lived out the rest of his days in Heacham in a house on Folgate and is buried in Heacham Churchyard.

Jimmy Groom

Private Groom's medals include the 1914-15 Star and Victory Medal. The ribbons also denote the fact that Pte. Groom should have also received the 1914 Medal, known as the Mons Star and the General Service Medal. The Medal with the red and Navy Ribbon is a Boer War medal.

Private Groom's uniform shows him wearing the Brittania cap badge of the Norfolk Regiment which became the Royal Norfolk Regiment in 1935
