#### Millenium Garden

I was born and grew up in Heacham and on a recent visit asked to see the Millenium Garden. It was my Aunt, Freda England, whose vision it was to see the Garden created. Trees had been planted there in memory of my parents and others known to me through extended family connections.

A friend and I enjoyed a lovely walk from the village centre. I anticipated an opportunity to spend a few minutes contemplating and fondly remembering those in whose memory trees had been planted. I envisioned a pleasant atmosphere surrounded by trees and a view of the Wash.

Reality bore no resemblance to my imagination. There isn't even any resemblance to a 'garden'. The trees have not been tended and, while some have flourished many have not. I recognize that not all saplings will survive but the area is a wasteland. The undergrowth is dense and very difficult to navigate. Nettles and huge thorns cannot be avoided as one tries to pinpoint the location of particular trees. While we located 3 or 4 identification tags, for the most part, trees remain unidentified. I understand trees grow and tags may become dislodged etc., but the total lack of care and maintenance is apparent and disrespectful.

The impression of an abandoned urban lot is completed by what I at first thought were the lids of take-out coffee containers. I learned the area is used for clay 'pigeon' shooting and, while it doesn't evoke a 'peaceful' image, it would be more acceptable if the undergrowth was kept low and these 'pigeons' could be retrieved with a good rake!

Admittedly we are 14 years on from the Millennium and interest wanes, but was there no provision for maintenance of this designated area? Properly cared for, the Garden could be a lovely attraction for residents and visitors alike. Writing from so many thousands of miles away I have little right to suggest work parties or other solutions to making the Garden a place of beauty. However, I do hope that efforts will be made to rectify the disgraceful state that is the current reality.



The Borough Council reports that the new recycling contract has started smoothly, so well done to everyone for joining the 'Recycling

Revolution'. Things to note when you are recycling is to keep everything separate, that means don't stuff a plastic bottle or a can inside a cardboard box and don't put shredded paper in a bag or box. The other good news is that the Borough Council have increased the capacity for the collection of garden waste through the Brown Bin Scheme, although the Team encourages composting of garden material where possible. The Team also thanks everyone for the support with the collection of lids for the charity The Matthew Project; deposits are higher than ever, so we appreciate you making the effort.

Heacham Green Team are asking residents if they realise just how much heat they are losing through their roofs if it is not properly insulated. Statistics state that a significant amount can be saved off the cost of heating bills by having a properly insulated roof. Heacham Green Team want to encourage residents to insulate their homes as it is good for people's pockets and good for reducing carbon emissions. The Team realise though it is not that easy for everyone to go to the local DIY store and nip up the loft themselves. The Team want to copy the scheme run in Reepham, Norfolk, where a bulk buying discount was negotiated for the village with a reputable company for materials and installation. Residents had a free survey to check if work was required and advice given to those who might qualify for a grant to cover the cost. The scheme meant that, as well as a good price, residents wary of being caught by rogue traders or hard sell techniques, could have peace of mind. Before we decide on whether or not to set up a similar scheme for Heacham, we need to know who might be interested.

#### The Kitchen Gardener

December – early winter. Farming in the Adirondacks, chefs perks for a maple syrup maker and an Amish breakfast.

I've been reading a fascinating account of a young couple who take on a lease of a disused five-hundred-acre farm in the

Adirondacks. There is an American model of community supported agriculture (CSA) whereby the farmer markets direct to the consumer, cutting out the middleman. Members of the scheme pay upfront for the year, giving the farmer income when he needs it most and, in turn, members are provided with produce, mainly vegetables, for the whole year.

This couple's aim was to venture beyond the CSA model - they wanted their farm to feed themselves and their neighbours with a whole diet of local organic food, more like the farms run by their great-grandparents' generation. They wanted to produce everything their members would need – various meats (the whole animal tongue to tail) from a herd of beef cattle, pigs and poultry, eggs, milk, cheese and other dairy, grains, flour, fruit and vegetables and some kind of sweetener, with the farm producing as much of its own energy, fertility and resources as possible.

They didn't make things easy for themselves, hand milking, slaughtering and butchering on site, raw milk cheese making and working the land with draught horses - on fields not farmed or worked for many years.

There's a lovely description of a long drive to a farm auction trying to find horse drawn tools, bidding and losing against the knowledgeable Amish but taking consolation from the thought

that if the price for these tools was high then the use of horses on farms was still providing a good living.

In March the first job was to tap their sugar bush – a stand of trees from which ash, pine and birch are logged out leaving light and nutrients for the sugar maples to thrive. Using begged, scavenged and borrowed spikes, buckets and a vat, they tapped over 150 trees, with buckets emptied daily and taken back to their barn by horse and cart.

Maple sap is mostly water which has to be boiled off to make the syrup. It takes roughly 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup and all the firewood had to be collected from around the farm and turned into kindling before the 250 gallon vat could be fired up.

It was (and is) a challenging and busy life, a pre-dawn to dusk existence of heavy physical work – hand milking, collecting and boiling sap together with all the other farm chores, and this was only the beginning of the year with the growing season still to come

Help and advice from the local farming community was very gratefully received, not least this must know chef's perks for the sap boileress. When you go, two hours before dawn, to work on your sap vat, take with you your coffee pot charged with freshly ground espresso beans and make the coffee with the boiling sap. Sip slowly, it's rocket fuel. Also, take along half a dozen eggs and cook them by dropping the eggs, in their shells, one by one into the boiling sap which seeps into the eggs. They are fished out with a long handled spoon, peeled and eaten hot with a sprinkle of salt.

The young farmers were keen to press home to members the need to use every part of a killed beast, so offered up scrapple, a favourite among the Amish and the recipe given to them by Amish friends. The bones, head, heart, liver and any other unused trimmings of the pig are boiled until the bones come away easily. The broth and the meat are passed through a grinder, the mixture is brought back to the boil, a fine meal of corn, wheat or buckwheat is added together with black pepper, salt and sage. It is poured into moulds and left to set.

To serve, it is sliced and fried until it is crispy both sides and eaten for breakfast with an egg, maple syrup, honey or mustard. The Amish often eat it in a sandwich.

What is interesting is how the same types of dishes are cooked in different regions and countries with slight variations. So, way back, the basic idea for a dish could be exchanged between travellers of all kinds, but at the end of the day you cooked with what you could lay your hands on and dishes evolved according to the availability of ingredients.

Scrapple is almost identical in ingredients and method to our own brawn, save the non-use of meal in the brawn. The brawn is also far more strongly seasoned — so it would not 'eat monotonous' - with old recipes using the occasion of brawn making to have a good old turn out of the spice box including the little ends of nutmeg too small for grating, (I bash mine in a pestle and mortar, maybe I should make brawn to go with them). Brawn stock is greatly reduced for flavour and a good set to the jelly, the scrapple is set by the added meal. A good floury baked potato and vinegary pickles are nice accompaniments to a slice or two of brawn.

This winter I shall be busy perusing the seed catalogues and having my usual hem and haw about what I'd like to have a little experiment with next year.

I'll be pruning the fruit trees and bushes that are safe to prune in the winter months, I like to get that job done by the end of December while it is still reasonably pleasant weather and I don't feel rushed into making a pruning cut because I'm cold and want to go indoors, but mainly because I don't prune when there's any frost around or ice on the wood.

If we get snow I'll wait until it just begins to melt and use the icy slush to scrub my paths, it brings them up all pale and interesting – until I walk the next load of mud all over them.

And, of course, how could I resist a bit more food for free. This time I'll be taking blackcurrant cuttings for a new bush or two, with not a clue where they are going to go in a year's time – always assuming they take.

I'll take cuttings about 10 inches long about a pencil width from well budded healthy wood of the current season's growth. I'll make a sloping cut just above a bud at the top and a straight cut just below a bud at the base. The cuttings will be inserted into the soil with only two buds showing above the surface, roughly eight to ten inches apart. They will be firmed in and given a drink, and I'll make sure they get a good drink during the inevitable dry periods if they grow away next year.

What I will not be doing this winter is pouring maple syrup or honey all over my brawn.



Hand 1 has 10pts (1 Ace = 4 + 1 King=3 + 1 Queen = 2 + 1 Jack = 1: Total 10) Hand 2 has 14pts (1 Ace = 4 + 2 Kings = 6 + 2 Queens = 4:

Total 14)

Hand 3 has 20pts (3 Aces = 12 + 2 Kings = 6 + 1 Queen = 2: Total 20)

Hand 4 has 3 pts (1 Queen = 2 + 1 Jack = 1: Total 3) Hand 5 has 9 pts (1 Ace = 4 + 1 King = 3 + 2 Jacks = 2: Total 9).

There are other factors involved in assessing the strengths and weaknesses of a bridge hand but, for the moment, the point count is the simplest and the best. As we move on, we will add other elements into the equation.

In the first article I explained how to deal and sort the cards and spent a little time on how you value your hand by assigning points to your Aces, Kings, Queens and Jacks. This week we are going to concentrate on what you do with the cards you are dealt.

First of all let me explain that suits have a pecking order and when you see hands laid out as I have done above or in a magazine, they are always in the same order; Spades, Hearts, Diamonds, Clubs. This is significant in bridge which will become clear in future articles.

Tricks: In its simplest form the main purpose of bridge is to make as many tricks as possible and to plagiarise Bruce Forsyth, "tricks means prizes". First of all, what is a trick? A trick is four cards one from each player and is won by the player who played the highest card. In bridge, the Ace is the highest card and the two the lowest.

Trumps: In bridge as in whist, there is a suit known as the trump suit. This becomes the most important suit in the pack and we will discuss this subject in later articles. For the moment we have assumed that there is no trump suit in operation.

Play of the hand: To introduce you to playing a hand, we will start as if we are playing whist. First of all, the dealer deals a card to each player who sort their cards into suits. Then, the person who dealt plays the first card which is placed face up on the table and play proceeds in a clockwise direction. The player on the dealer's left plays a card of the same suit and so on until all four players have played a card. As explained above, the player who has played the highest card, wins the trick and it is she/he who then plays the first card to the next trick. It can be a card in the same suit or a different one. Play continues until all cards have been played and thirteen tricks have been won or lost. Now to work out who has "won" the hand, you need to add up the tricks that you and your partner (he or she who is sitting opposite you) have won. If that comes to 7 or more, your side has won the hand as there are only 13 tricks in total to be won. You will notice that the hand with the most points normally wins the most tricks. One important thing to note at this stage is that the person who is sitting opposite you is your partner, if he or she has already won a trick, you would not have to play a higher card.

Now for some practice:

Look at the above hand and first of all work out how many points there are in each hand. Then West (the hand on the left) is the dealer and will play the first card. Play the cards as explained above (i.e. the winner of the trick plays first to the next trick) and see which partnership (NS or EW) have the most tricks at the end of the play.

It is probably easier to get a pack of cards and deal the hand because then you can see more clearly how a hand is played.

Is it me, or is that not just a fabulously original way to start a hit song? They don't write 'em like that any more ... in fact, they didn't before, and they haven't since! Step forward that most individual of songwriters and all-round tortured soul, Steven Patrick Morrissev.

This was a tale of, shall we say, a less than conventional liaison. And if the casual listener simply picked up on fairly standard lines like: "I would go out tonight / But I haven't got a stitch to wear," then what about: "Why pamper life's complexities / When the leather runs smooth on the passenger seat?"

She loves you yeah, yeah, yeah this wasn't!

And if you were wondering about the line: "A jumped-up pantry boy / Who never knew his place," it was one of the first examples of a Morrissey trick of borrowing a line of dialogue from a cult film - in this case the 1972 Laurence Olivier and Michael Caine movie, Sleuth.

The single also served as most people's introduction to the wonderful fretwork of Johnny Marr, who managed that increasingly difficult achievement - creating an instantly recognisable guitar sound all of his own.

This Charming Man had a high-speed jingle-jangle riff so catchy and insistent that once it got in your head it simply refused to

let go. Bouncing around like a demented pinball machine and flying into the furniture was almost inevitable.

It's unquestioned that Marr is a tremendously talented guitarist - but by his own admission, he'd try any trick, too. This track featured an ear-popping total of around 15 guitar overdubs, including backwards guitar, acoustic guitars ... and the sound of a knife being dropped on guitar strings! Hmm, not sure we can really hear that one, Johnny!



This was The Smiths' first hit (their first single, Hand In Glove, didn't chart), and unusually for a band considered one of the most iconic and influential of the Eighties, it was one of only three singles of theirs to make the Top Ten – and only then on reissue in 1992.

#### A.E. Wallis – 75 Years of Service 1939 – 2014

A.E Wallis of Heacham High Street celebrate their 75th Anniversary this year! Where has the time gone...



Back in 1939, Arthur Wallis, a young businessman with a keen interest in wireless, started a venture which is still going strong today. A single radio, electrical and cycle shop became established in Heacham with Arthur becoming a well-known face in the High Street. Reg Stainsby moved out of the High Street and A.E. Wallis moved in! The first few months of business were a struggle for Arthur especially undertaking many roles that the new business demanded: manager, salesman, delivery man, installer/electrician, handyman, cleaner and tea-boy! As you can imagine Arthur wore many "hats" throughout his day! He could often been seen cycling around the village on many a repair job and delivering accumulators to those homes electricity had not reached. Nevertheless, from little acorns, great oaks grow and though Arthur was tested with tough times, A.E. Wallis shops are still familiar with their proud shop fronts in the High Street.

As a young schoolboy, Arthur was fascinated with wireless. He made up crystal sets for his family and for local Heacham residents. These became popular around 1920-1930 and were known as "cat's whisker". They were a cheap form of radio that did not require electricity or expensive batteries. He served with the RAF working on aircraft wireless and transmitters, serving in North Africa and also Aden where, after installing a projector in the Sultans Palace, he was treated to a 6 course dinner that evening full of Eastern Promise! During the latter part of the war, Arthur saw service at RAF Bircham Newton. Whilst fulfilling his duty to Queen and country, Arthur's family kept the shop running for him and, whilst based at Bircham Newton, his thoughts turned to future plans for his business. The war years were costly to his business, but the family

managed to keep things ticking over.

Once demobbed, Arthur set about purchasing the adjacent shop to his existing shop so he could move the radio and electrical goods to the new site



allowing the original shop premises to accommodate the cycles.



At this point in 1947, Arthur took on his first member of staff, Roy Gray. Roy was employed as a cycle mechanic and remained with Arthur and the family firm until his retirement. Roy was well known for his advice and expertise on cycling problems and was a local familiar face to turn to. Over the years, valued and trusted staff worked alongside the family such as Jack Skoyles, employed as an electrical engineer and Geoff Robinson, who is still with the family today.

On November 2nd, 1936 the BBC began transmitting the world's first public television service from Alexandra Palace, North London. In 1949. Sutton Coldfield transmitter became the first television transmitter to broadcast outside London and the Home Counties, bringing BBC Television to viewers outside the south east of England for the first time and Holme Moss transmitter was launched in 1951. Arthur had set up the first ever television in Heacham in his parents' home. With television transmission becoming clearer in our area, sales were on the increase. In 1953 sales were boosted tremendously with big demand for televisions for families to watch the funeral of King George VI and the coronation of Elizabeth II. Arthur also married Joan during this year, unfortunately it wasn't broadcast! With more television channels appearing (ITV & BBC2) and colour transmission appearing in the 1960's, television sales were steadily increasing and along with TV's, there was a high demand for aerials too!

Arthur's business now needed more room, sales were doing well and storage space was becoming a problem. During the 1960's, Arthur used the premises at 4 The High Street, Heacham as a warehouse. During the 1980's the cycle shop was moved there to allow the original shop more room for electrical goods. The cycle shop remained there for a couple of years until returning when further expansion took place at the original shop.

Arthur purchased another unit in 1989 (previously an estate agents) to accommodate the cycle shop and to unite all the shops once again. Building works were carried out to the original shop to create one big shop to house all the electrical side of the business. Around 1999/2000 again more room was needed and the family expanded the shop to the familiar sight we see in the High Street today.



In 1982 Arthur's two sons, John and Richard, joined their father and the business became a partnership. Richard focussed on the electrical side of the business and John, who still worked in King's Lynn, became engaged in fitting aerials on his days off

transporting the equipment in his Ford Capri (the firm's van!).




Christmas presents to think about: Good binoculars; a telescope; a subscription to 'Sky at Night' magazine; a book; membership of a local astronomy club; or even a chance to get a bit of yourself, or someone else, on the moon. At the time of writing, 19th November, details of Lunar Mission One has just appeared on the news and on-line. For donations of £3 to £5000 you can be part of a British

mission to the moon. See lunarmission1.com. Initial crowd sourcing finishes at midnight on December 17th. If £600K has not been raised by then the project will probably fail. £200K

A lasting legacy

has been sourced in the first day.

And will LM1 be launched from Britain? The proposal to build a spaceport has not gone away and it might be operating within 4 years. Six of the 8 possible locations were in Scotland prior to the referendum but I hope those possibilities have now bit the dust, leaving Newquay, Cornwall or a site in North Wales. I suggested the fields at the top of School Road or the land south of Hunstanton.



The last month has been pretty dire as far as observing is concerned, cloud or mist obscuring the skies most nights. I did manage to see Uranus close to the moon on 4th November but it was difficult – the

glare of the moon swamping the faint blue dot of the planet.

What to see in what remains of December and throughout January? - Planets, meteorites, a bit of the moon you might not have noticed, the eye of Medusa and an asteroid.

In December, Venus comes back into the evening sky after returning from the far side of the sun. At the end of the first week look due SW at about 3.30pm. The sun will still be peeping over the horizon so view from Heacham Beaches and take care. Look for a bright speck to the left of the sun. As the month progresses Venus will get higher as the sun gets lower and will be joined by Mercury, a smaller brilliant speck. Just after sunset on Christmas Eve, around 3.30pm, Mercury, Venus and the waxing crescent moon form a line, Mercury close to the horizon,

the moon highest. It is a similar picture on days either side. As the sky darkens and Venus dips below the horizon look for the red dot of Mars directly to the left of the moon.

Mercury and Venus appear to move closer together as the nights move on. They are about 30 apart on New Year's Eve and just 10 apart on 12th January. Later, on the 21st at 6pm, the thin crescent moon will be close to these planets making a very good picture to observe or photograph. Don't forget to look for Mars too. It will be visible somewhat above and to the left of the Venus / Mercury pairing all of the second half of the month at about 5pm.



This picture was taken from the sea wall in February. Mercury is the dot between the clouds near the bottom.


So, a little early evening observation from the sea defences will let you observe three planets with your eyes – although binoculars will give a better view particularly of Mercury, but only use these after the sun has dipped out of view.



Our companion from last month, Uranus, is still around but just in December. Stellarium, available in the library, will help you find it. Look SW at between 40 and 50 degrees above the horizon. Neptune is much lower and SSW and needs a telescope to reveal it. Jupiter is visible in the east and high enough to observe around 10pm. It moves higher and further south as December gives way to January. As readers well know, Jupiter is certainly worth a look as good binoculars will reveal the four Galilean moons and a telescope shows the cloud bands.

Saturn is a morning object through until the end of January. If you are up and functional at 6.30am on Christmas morning and have a SE horizon, Saturn is about 10 degrees above it. From then on Saturn moves a little higher and further south. The sun begins to rise earlier so half way through January you need to look at 5.30am.

The Geminid Meteor Shower 4-17th December with peak nights on 13/14th and 14/15th. Best show likely on 13/14th from midnight but look earlier too. The moon is present so look away from it or, at least, not directly at it.



The Moon wobbles as it orbits the Earth. These *librations* let us see around the 'edges' from time to time – we see a bit of the surface usually out of view. Between 6th and 12th December circumstances are such that the 'normal' northern limb is tipped towards us a little and a few craters you may not have seen pop up – Byrd, Peary, Florey and Hermite for example. Use a moon map – Google one – and binoculars.

The Eye of Medusa or the Demon Star. This is the star Algol which is two stars rotating around each other – a binary. They are lined up such that the fainter of the pair passes across the face of the brighter one – we effectively see an eclipse which reduces the apparent brightness about every 3 days for 10 hours. (There is also a third star associated with the eclipsing pair but this star does not eclipse either of them). It is high in the sky throughout December and January. Up until Christmas look south and straight up, well above and well to the right of Orion. You are looking for a red/orange star. As the month(s) move on Algol will appear to move towards the west and a little lower. Use Stellarium to help or any of the many websites which tell you what to look for each night.

Juno, an asteroid, is possibly visible through binoculars towards the end of January. Juno was classed as a planet until the 1850's but is now an asteroid whereas Ceres, a bigger *former* planet and *then* asteroid is now a dwarf planet. Juno is about 200 miles across. In the last week of January it will be found, 30 degrees above the horizon between Jupiter to the left and Sirius (brightest star due south) to the right.

Asteroids are lumps of rock, sometimes metallic, which orbit the sun. Bigger than meteors by several orders, most, like Juno, orbit between Mars and Jupiter but some have more independent orbits and some come quite close to Earth; infrequently an unknown one smacks into it. The relatively recent Russian meteorite which was filmed by dashboard cameras is classed by some as an asteroid and by (a few) as a comet. The distinction between all three, certainly between asteroids and comets, has blurred in recent years as trails have been seen emerging from some asteroids and some comets appear to be a bit more solid than expected - like Comet Churyumov-Gerasimenko of Rosetta and Philae fame.

I trust you watched the drama of the Philae landing. It bounced about a mile upwards after touching down on its designated landing site. This was named Agilkia by some Frenchman who won the naming contest. I like to think where it ended up could now be called by my name entry – Hergotestane – which is the Anglo Saxon name for Haggerston where Edmund Halley (Halley's Comet) was born in 1658.

Penultimate thing: I am giving a talk entitled 'Hunstanton's Evening Stars' 7.30pm on 21st January at Hunstanton Town Hall. Work has been continuing apace on lifeboat *Lucy Lavers*, readying her for her return trip to Dunkirk in May 2015, 75 years on, to mark the anniversary of the evacuation of troops from the beaches.

The difficult job of drilling through the keel to fit the centreboard has been completed and the newly forged centre plate is in place. Bronze work has been cleaned and where necessary cast to make additional parts. More coats of Witham paint have been applied to *Lucy Lavers*' hull with more to come. The engine has been stripped and restored and is ready for installation. The new build of the mahogany engine canopy is under way. The sails and spars are ready. You can see films of the work on our website. There will be a celebration of *Lucy Lavers* re-launch in Wells **on Saturday morning, 11th April** 

2015 – do put the date in your diary.



Plans are well advanced for Lucy Lavers' commemorative return to Dunkirk. With a different crew for each leg of the journey, she will be setting off from Wellsnext-the-Sea in early May and calling at Lowestoft, Southwold, Aldeburgh, Levington, Harwich and

Ramsgate on the way. There will be a big welcome home in Wells towards the end of May. After her return, *Lucy Lavers* will 'live' in Wells and give pre-booked trips afloat.

#### Local NHS campaign urges patients in West Norfolk and Wisbech areas to 'Choose Me Not A&E' this winter

A high-profile campaign has been launched across West Norfolk and the Wisbech area to help people choose the right NHS service for them.

The 'Choose Me Not A&E' campaign aims to provide people with vital information about which health care service is right for the symptoms they have.

Figures show that about 250 people a month attend A&E at The Queen Elizabeth Hospital, King's Lynn (QEH), but are sent home requiring no treatment.

This means every year, about 3,000 local people wait for hours in A&E when they could have got quicker and more appropriate treatment closer to home.

Not only are residents wasting hours of their valuable time waiting, but they potentially block access to services for other people in more urgent need.

The Choose Me Not A&E campaign is being led by NHS West Norfolk Clinical Commissioning Group and Wisbech Local Commissioning Group in collaboration with the QEH.

Dr Ian Mack, Chair of West Norfolk CCG, said: "This campaign has a powerful, local message: Help the QEH save lives this winter. We want people to understand that A&E is for serious, life-threatening emergencies only. Inappropriate use of A&E increases waiting times for those patients who are genuinely in need of urgent medical attention.

"Many people could easily be treated by a local pharmacist, GP, or even just by staying at home and looking after themselves. Our message is simple - if it's not a serious medical emergency, A&E is not the right choice."

"If you are not sure which service to use log on to our new website ChooseMeNotAandE.co.uk to find out more, or pick up one of the campaign leaflets to see your options. You can also use the NHS 111 number which can put you in touch with the best service for you."

The first defence against ill health is self-care and prevention. Here are some top tips from local GPs for staying healthy over the winter:

- Eat healthily food is vital for keeping you warm.
- Take some exercise we know it's getting cold but even staying active in your home makes a difference.
- Wrap up warm when you go outside it's often a good idea to layer your clothing.
- Stock up on medicines paracetamol, aspirin, ibuprofen decongestant and aspirin.
- Get a flu jab the vaccine is free for those in an eligible group. To find out if you are in an eligible group visit www.nhs.uk
- Keep your home warm your main living room should be between around 18-21C (65-70F) and the rest of the house at a minimum of 16C (61F). For more Warm and Well information about www.norfolk.gov.uk

**Rotary Matters** 

By the time you read this report the second of our three mock interview sessions will have taken place. In these we give interview practice to Smithdon High School students who, this year, will sit for their GCSE examinations. When they eventually go for their first interview, whether it be for University or for a job, they will be less daunted through having been made aware of what is likely to take place at the interview. As interviewers, Rotarians are from different businesses and professions themselves and we do our best to pass on our experiences of interviewing to the students.

From the Rotary Club of Downham Market we were pleased to welcome Rotarian Carole Samuel and her husband, Past District Governor John, to one of our meetings. Their Club members are working hard to raise money to help children whose health has been damaged in Belarus as a result of the 1986 Chernobyl nuclear disaster. Belarus lies west of Poland and north of the Ukraine. The children's school lay in a polluted area where thyroid cancer and leukaemia occur due to the escaped radioactivity. Blankets, towels, school equipment and numerous other articles are desperately needed. The school itself is clean and well-cared for and more than forty years old. The teachers do the decorating and classrooms are bare. The school gets relatively little money from the government. All donated items go out by plane to local Rotarians who take it to the school. 

#### HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

#### Parish Council Meetings November in Brief

**Vehicle Activation Sign:** The Council noted that the sign was now operational. The Council hoped that this would alert drivers to the need to reduce their speed on entering the village via Lamsey Lane.

**Litter:** The Council discussed how to encourage residents and visitors to respect the village and take their litter home. Mr Parton agreed to put together a proposal incorporating the ideas discussed, which included the reinstatement of the annual village litter pick. The Clerk reported that the Anglia in Bloom judges assessed the village for litter, so Heacham In Bloom would be likely to support any anti-litter initiatives.

**Parish Clerk Vacancy:** The Council noted that the Clerk vacancy had been advertised and interviews would be carried out in December. It was hoped that the successful applicant would be in post prior to the current Clerk's departure on 31 January 2015.

**Hopkins Homes:** The Council reviewed the amended plans which included the proposal to create a round-about at the Redgate Junction with the A149. The access road from the new estate appeared to become the primary road and Hunstanton Road would be diverted to join the access road at a separate junction. No technical details for the road layout were submitted with the revised application, but the Parish Council agreed the amendments did not alter the Council's overall objection to the development.

Community Services Building: The Council noted that there had been positive feedback about the project from the drop in sessions held at the end of October. The Council also noted that the purchase of the building should be concluded by Christmas and work to clear the site should start in the New Year, subject to necessary permissions and contract.

**Heacham Historical Society:** The Council agreed that the Community Activities Committee could arrange a village meeting to see if there was sufficient interest in the setting up of a Heacham Historical/Heritage Society or group. An event would be planned in February at the Old Friends Hall, details of which would be published in the Newsletter.

Parish Council Budget 2015-2016: The Chairman thanked the Committees on the work already done on plans for the next financial year. The Clerk reported that the Borough Council would still be able to pay a settlement grant, but it was likely to be around 15% less next year. The Parish Council would finalise the precept at the January meeting.

**School Road Development:** The Council noted that the Appeal would be held at Lynnsport in King's Lynn on Tuesday 27 January 2015.

#### Christmas Rubbish

Residents are advised to check their collection calendars for rubbish collections over the Christmas and New Year period. The Borough Council will also be popping reminders onto bins in the week before Christmas. If you find your bins are full, extra waste can be disposed of in separate black bags sealed with special red tags which are available for purchase at the Parish Council Office, priced £1.50. These sealed bags can then be put out with the black bins.

#### **Grit Bins**

Hopefully they will not be needed, but if icy there are numerous Grit Bins at key points in the village. Please use the grit sparingly as a tablespoon of grit will treat an area of 1m<sup>2</sup>. Please also note that the grit is only for use on the public highway and footways and that it should never be taken for use on private driveways or paths as this will be considered theft.

#### Heacham Parish Council Events Facebook Page

The Parish Council has been trialling a Facebook page to provide information on the various events it organises throughout the year like the Carnival Parade and volunteer work days. The page appears to work well and the Council invite you to like the page and share events as they are posted. Please note that it is specifically for Parish Council Events and will only deal with queries relating to those events. Other queries should be addressed to the Parish Council Office in the usual way.

#### **Elections Are Coming**

Next year is an election year, where seats for Parliament and the Borough Council will be contested alongside those of the Parish Council. There is some concern that the Parish Council elections will get lost under the sheer weight of what is likely to be a fiercely contested general election. However, the Parish Council does play an important role in village life and it is hoped that a sufficient number of residents will stand for election to warrant a vote. There is plenty of time to think about standing, the deadline for nomination is 9 April 2015, and if you would like more information about the role of a parish councillor in Heacham then please get in touch with the Parish Council office.
